The Board of Trustees of the Village of Stickney met in regular session on Tuesday, May 16, 2017, at 7:00 p.m. in the Stickney Village Hall, 6533 W. Pershing Road, Stickney, Illinois.

Upon the roll call, the following Trustees were present: Trustees Hrejsa, Kapolnek, Milenkovic, Torres and White Absent: Trustee Savopoulos

Trustee Milenkovic moved, duly seconded by Trustee Hrejsa to approve the minutes of the previous regular session on Tuesday, May 2, 2017.

Upon the roll call, the following Trustees voted: Ayes: Trustee Hrejsa, Kapolnek, Milenkovic, Torres and White Nays: None Absent: Trustee Savopoulos Mayor Walik declared the motion carried.

Trustee White moved, duly seconded by Trustee Milenkovic that the bills, approved by the various committees of the Board, be approved for payment, and to approve warrants which authorize the Village Treasurer to draw checks to pay the bills, to be signed by the authorized signers, as provided for by the Ordinances of the Village of Stickney.

Upon the roll call, the following Trustees voted: Ayes: Trustee Hrejsa, Kapolnek, Milenkovic, Torres and White Nays: None Absent: Trustee Savopoulos Mayor Walik declared the motion carried.

At this time Mayor Walik presented the following award to Coach Arturo Terrazas. The Mayor said, "Thank you for your time, talent and commitment to the youth of our community, thank you for your dedication." "Congratulations on your successful 2016-2017 basketball season." Coach Terrazas then presented certificates to each member of the fifth grade teams from Edison and also Home Schools. A certificate was also presented to the Cheerleading Coaches. There were certificates given to the cheerleaders.

Mayor Walik conducted the swearing in oath for Cruz Ortiz Jr. for the rank of Sergeant of the Stickney Police Department. William Ramski received his swearing in oath as our new Probationary Officer for the Stickney Police Department.

Deputy Police Chief Rich Jaczak and Deputy Fire Chief Andrea Acosta received their swearing in oath for their appointments.

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Trustee White moved, duly seconded by Trustee Kapolnek to concur with the Mayor's appointments.

Upon the roll call, the following Trustees voted: Ayes: Trustee Hrejsa, Kapolnek, Milenkovic, Torres and White Nays: None Absent: Trustee Savopoulos Mayor Walik declared the motion carried.

Trustee White moved, duly seconded by Trustee Torres to approve Resolution 10-2017, A Resolution Authorizing and Approving Certain Changes to Bank Accounts of the Village of Stickney."

Upon the roll call, the following Trustees voted: Ayes: Trustee Hrejsa, Kapolnek, Milenkovic, Torres and White Nays: None Absent: Trustee Savopoulos Mayor Walik declared the motion carried.

Trustee White explained prior to the vote that this resolution will enable our new mayor and treasurer to get on all the accounts. The clerk is already on the accounts. We need two signers on all our accounts. This is a change in our banking so we could conduct business.

Trustee White moved, duly seconded by Trustee Torres to strike item 13 from the agenda.

The Mayor asked, "All in favor" "Aye" was the response given. Trustee Savopoulos was absent.

MAYOR'S REPORT: Mayor Walik thanked people for showing up. He then thanked all the kids for a great (basketball) season. The mayor then reported on the Arbor Day program that was held at Edison School and Home School. Each school will be receiving a tree in honor of Arbor Day. The planting must be postponed due to the weather and the year-end-budget. Trustee Milenkovic is the chairman of the Tree Board. A reminder was given for the Memorial Day Program on Monday, May 29, 2017. It will be at the Veteran's Memorial in the 3900 block of Ridgeland. The program will take place rain or shine. A luncheon will be served at the American Legion Post located at 6431 Pershing Road. All are invited. The mayor announced that they will be organizing a program for well-being checks for seniors or disabled. He asked for suggestions. We will have the ability to register family or friends. Lastly, the mayor read a Proclamation recognizing May 7 to 13, 2017 as Municipal Clerks Week and extended appreciation to Clerk Audrey McAdams.

CLERK'S REPORT: Clerk McAdams announced that the newsletter should be in your mailboxes by June 3. Expect the newsletter to be larger than ever with a lot of information.

TRUSTEE REPORTS: Trustee Hrejsa is the trustee for Parks & Recreation along with Trustee Torres. They had a meeting on May 10, 2017. They will be in the Little League Parade on May 13. Music in the Park will start on June 7. Friends of the Library will be cooking. There will be three cruise nights. She hopes that Trustee Savopoulos will help out with his car club for the cruise nights. She mentioned that Parks & Recreation wants to bring back some activities that they had in the past. She asked for people to volunteer especially for activities in the fall.

Trustee Torres told us that she oversees Police, Homeland Security/Disasters and Blight. She explained that she is working to get our new blight inspector out there to do the inspections on the homes. Most of this information will be in our newsletter. She then took the time to thank our Mayor. He has put in over 80 hours this week. He is working hard to get everything in our village in order. It is a pleasure working with him to get these things started.

Trustee Kapolnek reported that the Municipal Water Reclamation District is having an open house this Saturday from 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon they are having tours. He then congratulated all the kids and the coaches for a job well done.

Trustee Milenkovic attended the Midway Noise Compatibility Commission meeting. Our airplane noise levels are down to 52.1 decibels. The threshold is 65 decibels for insulation remediation. There were no noise complaints from Stickney this quarter. The next meeting is July 22. He informed us that resident Mark Kusper attended this current meeting.

Mayor Walik asked that we notice that Trustee Savopoulos was not at this meeting because his father is not well and he was in the hospital with him.

Trustee White commented that these last two weeks have been like a honeymoon. We are getting used to each other. No divorces yet. He then commended the Mayor on all his appointments. Everyone is on the same page. It is refreshing. The Mayor is here every day and all day. He is accessible. If you have questions don't hesitate to call. We started on our new fiscal year 2017-2018. The department heads will be starting their worksheets. The budget has to be posted by July 1.

DEPARTMENT REPORTS:

Public Works Supervisor Joe Lopez informed us that construction on Harlem Avenue will begin on June 1. We are expecting a lot of traffic. Our garbage pickup and recycling will be pushed back a day. He asked that people move their cars for sweeping.

Treasurer Paul Nosek was introduced. He comes to us from Darien with 12-years of experience. We were told that we are transitioning over from the finance department from the gentlemen who had been here for a very long time. He thanked for the help he received from the department heads. He explained that we will rescind the contract with GW and Associates for the consulting. We will save \$4,000. Hopefully we will be a more transparent government. If anyone had questions on finances, they are free to call him.

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Fire Chief Jeff Boyajian elaborated on the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District tour. They provide an important service at that plant.

Police Chief Dan Babich stated that he has been in law enforcement for 30 years and never caught a bank robber. Within one month it happened twice and it was done by female officers who captured these people. On May 9th the Stickney Police Department received a 911 call from the U.S. Bank at 4001 S. Harlem Avenue that they are being held up by a male white subject wearing a blue ball cap wearing carhart tan bibs. Officers Guzman and Sergeant Figueroa and Officer Pedro Garcia arrived at the bank as Officer Guzman observed a subject sitting in a red commercial van with a subject fitting that description. It was confirmed by Officer Guzman that this was the man we were looking for who robbed the bank. When the man saw the officers the subject began to exit his vehicle and run across Harlem Avenue but was stopped by traffic. Officer Guzman and Sergeant Figueroa gave chase and were able to grab the offender pulling him to the ground. They search him and found no weapon. He had a drill and probably told the woman it was a gun. The offender had \$7,500 in cash inside the van, which was stolen out of Chicago. The offender and situation was turned over to the FBI for prosecution. Nobody got hurt. It was due to the dedication of these officers. The fact that the bank called 911 and got us there quicker instead of calling the bank service.

There have been changes within the Stickney Police Department. Three of our police officers have resigned from the police department to take on new positions within other police departments and we wish them well in their endeavors.

Sergeant Gary Wiseman, who served the Stickney Police Department for 37 years, has retired and now has become the Chief of Police for Forest View. He will be greatly missed but within reach.

We have one new police officer, William Ramski Jr. graduating from the College of DuPage Police Academy June 23, 2017 and will then go through an extensive 10-week field training program with certified officers with the Stickney Police Department before being left on his own.

Two new SUV Police Vehicles, one is a Tahoe and the other an Explorer, will be coming in June and we will be working on better efficient lighting for these vehicles to protect officers on traffic stops. A majority of police officers are hit while making traffic stops. We are also making each of the vehicles unified inside and out the same for officer safety and consistency. Every year when we purchase a new vehicle, everything will be kept the same.

We lost three officers who moved on to other towns because they wanted to go to bigger locations. We wish them the best. The Village of Stickney will be hiring three new police officers in the month of June through a process call Lateral Hiring. This process saves the village revenue because we are hiring seasoned veteran police officers who have worked five to fifteen years and are already trained police officers certified through the Illinois Training Board. These officers will be put through a 6week Field Training Program with our training officers and then they will be released to work as officers on the street. This way it is saving the village a lot of money in

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training and a lot of money in sending them to the academy. If they really know the area, we have them up and running in two weeks. At this time we have been able to still provide adequate manpower for the Village of Stickney and the safety of our community and residents.

Starting June 1, 2017 the Stickney Police Department will be condensing and conducting a major inventory collected over the last fifty years in our evidence room. It is going to be computerized, reinvigorated, things that need to be destroyed will be gotten rid of. This will all done in the next few months so that we meet all state requirements, while safe guarding the integrity of all our evidence placed in our evidence rooms. We are going to try to condense it in one area.

He then told us that he is honored to be part of this board and a part of this community. He thanked us for allowing him to be here.

Finally, Mayor Walik recognized Gary Wisemen in the audience. Gary Wisemen had been his boss for half of his career. He wished him luck in Forest View.

There being no further business, Trustee White moved, duly seconded by Trustee Hrejsa that the meeting be adjourned. Upon which the Board adopted the motion at 7:40 p.m.

ORDINANCE NO. 2017-06

AN ORDINANCE ADOPTING CHAPTER 22, SECTION 22-10 OF THE MUNICIPAL CODE, VILLAGE OF STICKNEY, ILLINOIS REGARDING CONFLICTS WITH CERTAIN HOME RULE COUNTY ORDINANCES

WHEREAS, the Village of Stickney (the "Village") is a home rule municipal corporation in accordance with Article VII, Section 6(a) of the Constitution of the State of Illinois of 1970; and

WHEREAS, the Village has the authority to adopt ordinances and to promulgate rules and regulations that pertain to its government and affairs, and to review, interpret and amend its ordinances, rules and regulations; and

WHEREAS, the Village President (the "President") and the Board of Trustees of the Village (the "Village Board" and with the President, the "Corporate Authorities") are committed to ensuring the growth of the local economy; and

WHEREAS, on October 5, 2016, the County of Cook Board of Commissioners adopted an ordinance that requires employers in Cook County to provide a minimum number of paid sick days to employees and on October 26, 2016, the County of Cook Board of Commissioners adopted an ordinance creating a minimum wage for employers in Cook County (together, the "Cook County Ordinances"); and

WHEREAS, the Village finds that these Cook County Ordinances place an undue burden on employers within the Village given the current rights of employees available under Federal and State law; and

WHEREAS, Article VII Section 6(c) of the Illinois Constitution provides that if a home rule county ordinance conflicts with an ordinance of a municipality, the municipal ordinance shall prevail within its jurisdiction; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to its home rule powers, the Village finds it in the best interest of the Village and its residents to amend the Municipal Code, Village of Stickney, Illinois (the "Village Code") to clearly define the sick leave and minimum wage regulations that apply to employers located in the Village; and

WHEREAS, based upon the foregoing, the Corporate Authorities have determined that it is in the best interests of the Village and its residents to adopt Chapter 22, Section 22-10 of the Village Code as set forth below;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE PRESIDENT AND BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF STICKNEY, COOK COUNTY, ILLINOIS, as follows:

ARTICLE I. IN GENERAL

SECTION 1. INCORPORATION CLAUSE.

The Corporate Authorities hereby find that all of the recitals hereinbefore stated as contained in the preambles to this Ordinance are full, true and correct and do hereby, by reference, incorporate and make them part of this Ordinance as legislative findings.

SECTION 2. PURPOSE.

The purpose of this Ordinance is to adopt Chapter 22, Section 22-10 of the Village Code to clearly define the sick leave and minimum wage regulations that apply to employers located in the Village, and to authorize the President or his designee to take all actions necessary to carry out the intent of this Ordinance.

ARTICLE II.

ADOPTION OF CHAPTER 22, SECTION 22-10 OF THE MUNICIPAL CODE, VILLAGE OF STICKNEY, ILLINOIS

SECTION 3.0 ADOPTION OF CHAPTER 22, SECTION 22-10.

That the Village Code is hereby amended, notwithstanding any provision, ordinance, resolution or Village Code section to the contrary, by adopting Chapter 22, Section 22-10 as follows:

Sec. 22-10. - Reserved Minimum Hourly Wages and Paid Sick Leave.

a. Employers located within the Village shall comply with all applicable federal and/or State laws and regulations as such laws and regulations may exist from time to time with regard to both the payment of minimum hourly wages and paid sick leave. Employee eligibility for paid sick leave and minimum hourly wages shall also be in compliance with all applicable federal and/or State laws and regulations as such laws and regulations may exist from time to time.

b. No additional obligations with regard to paid sick leave, or minimum hourly wages, including, without limitation, any additional obligations by ordinance adopted by the County of Cook Board of Commissioners, shall apply to employers located within the Village, except those required by federal and/or State laws and regulations as such laws and regulations may exist from time to time.

c. For the purposes of this Section, the term "employee" means an individual permitted to work by an employer regardless of the number of persons the employer employs, and the term "employer" means any person employing one or more employees, or seeking to employ one or more employees, if the person has its principal place of business within the Village or does business within the Village.

d. For the purposes of this Section, the term "employer" does not mean:

<u>1. the government of the United States or a corporation wholly owned by the government of the United States;</u>

2. an Indian tribe or a corporation wholly owned by an Indian tribe;

3. the government of the State or any agency or department thereof; or

4. the government of any municipality.

SECTION 3.1. OTHER ACTIONS AUTHORIZED.

The officers, employees and/or agents of the Village shall take all action necessary or reasonably required to carry out, give effect to and consummate the amendments contemplated by this Ordinance and shall take all action necessary in conformity therewith. The officers, employees and/or agents of the Village are specifically authorized and directed to draft and disseminate any and all necessary forms or notices to be utilized in connection with the intent of this Ordinance.

ARTICLE III. HEADINGS, SAVINGS CLAUSES, PUBLICATION, EFFECTIVE DATE

SECTION 4. HEADINGS.

The headings of the articles, sections, paragraphs and subparagraphs of this Ordinance are inserted solely for the convenience of reference and form no substantive part of this Ordinance nor should they be used in any interpretation or construction of any substantive provision of this Ordinance.

SECTION 5. SEVERABILITY.

The provisions of this Ordinance are hereby declared to be severable and should any provision of this Ordinance be determined to be in conflict with any law, statute or regulation by a court of competent jurisdiction, said provision shall be excluded and deemed inoperative, unenforceable and as though not provided for herein and all other provisions shall remain unaffected, unimpaired, valid and in full force and effect.

SECTION 6. SUPERSEDER.

All code provisions, ordinances, resolutions, rules and orders, or parts thereof, in conflict herewith are, to the extent of such conflict, hereby superseded.

SECTION 7. PUBLICATION.

A full, true and complete copy of this Ordinance shall be published in pamphlet form or in a newspaper published and of general circulation within the Village as provided by the Illinois Municipal Code, as amended.

SECTION 8. EFFECTIVE DATE.

This Ordinance shall be effective and in full immediately after its passage and approval.

ORDINANCE NO. 2017-07

AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING THE PREVAILING WAGE RATES FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OF PUBLIC WORKS PROJECTS FOR THE VILLAGE OF STICKNEY

WHEREAS, the Village of Stickney (the "Village") is a home rule municipal corporation in accordance with Article VII, Section 6(a) of the Constitution of the State of Illinois of 1970; and

WHEREAS, the Village has the authority to adopt ordinances and to promulgate rules and regulations that pertain to its government and affairs, and to review, interpret and amend its ordinances, rules and regulations; and

WHEREAS, the State of Illinois has enacted the Prevailing Wage Act (820 ILCS 130/0.01, *et seq.*) (the "Act"), which regulates the wages of laborers, mechanics and other workers employed in any public works by the state, county, city or any public body or political subdivision or by anyone under contract for public works projects; and

WHEREAS, the Act requires the Village to investigate and ascertain the prevailing rate of wages, as defined in the Act, for laborers, mechanics and other workers in the locality of the Village employed in performing the construction of public works projects for the Village; and

WHEREAS, the Illinois Department of Labor ("IDOL") has issued revised prevailing wage rates for laborers, mechanics and other workers performing the construction of public works projects for this year; and

WHEREAS, in order to provide adequate notice to Village workers and residents, the Village President (the "President") and the Board of Trustees of the Village (the "Village Board" and with the President, the "Corporate Authorities") have determined that it is in the best interests of the Village to adopt IDOL's most current revised prevailing rate of wages for the construction of public works projects in the Village (the "Determination"), attached hereto and incorporated herein as Exhibit A;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE PRESIDENT AND BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF STICKNEY, COOK COUNTY, ILLINOIS, as follows:

ARTICLE I. IN GENERAL

SECTION 1. INCORPORATION CLAUSE.

The Corporate Authorities hereby find that all of the recitals hereinbefore stated as contained in the preambles to this Ordinance are full, true and correct and do hereby, by reference, incorporate and make them part of this Ordinance as legislative findings.

SECTION 2. PURPOSE.

The purpose of this Ordinance is to establish the prevailing wage rates for the construction of public works projects in the Village, in accordance with the Act and the Determination.

ARTICLE II. AUTHORIZATION

SECTION 3. AUTHORIZATION.

To the extent and as required by the Act, the general prevailing rate of wages in the Village for laborers, mechanics and other workers engaged in the construction of public works projects coming under the jurisdiction of the Village is ascertained to be the same as the prevailing rate of wages for construction work within the Cook County, Illinois, area, as determined by IDOL as of June 2017. The definition of any terms appearing in this Ordinance that are also used in the Act shall be the same as in the Act. As required by the Act, any and all revisions of the prevailing rate of wages made by IDOL shall supersede the Village's current Determination for the construction of public works projects in the Village. Nothing herein shall be construed to apply the general prevailing rate of wages as herein ascertained to any work or employment except public works of the Village to the extent required by the Act.

SECTION 3.01. OTHER ACTIONS AUTHORIZED.

The Village Clerk or a designee of the same is hereby authorized and directed to: (a) publicly post, or keep available for inspection by any interested party in the main office of the Village, the Determination; (b) promptly (and in no event later than July 15, 2017) file a certified copy of this Ordinance and the Determination in the office of IDOL; and (c) within thirty (30) calendar days after filing with IDOL, publish in a newspaper of general circulation within the Village that the Determination is effective, publish a notice of the Determination and promptly mail a copy of the Determination to any employer, to any association of employers and to any person or association of employees who have filed or who file their names and addresses, requesting copies of any determination, stating the particular rates and the particular class of the Village shall take all action necessary or reasonably required to carry out, give effect to and consummate the intent of this Ordinance and shall take all action necessary in conformity therewith. The officers, employees and/or agents of the Village are specifically authorized and directed to draft and disseminate any and all necessary forms to be utilized in connection with this Ordinance.

ARTICLE III. HEADINGS, SAVINGS CLAUSES, PUBLICATION, EFFECTIVE DATE

SECTION 4. HEADINGS.

The headings of the articles, sections, paragraphs and subparagraphs of this Ordinance are inserted solely for the convenience of reference and form no substantive part of this Ordinance nor should they be used in any interpretation or construction of any substantive provision of this Ordinance.

SECTION 5. SEVERABILITY.

The provisions of this Ordinance are hereby declared to be severable and should any provision of this Ordinance be determined to be in conflict with any law, statute or regulation by a court of competent jurisdiction, said provision shall be excluded and deemed inoperative, unenforceable and as though not provided for herein and all other provisions shall remain unaffected, unimpaired, valid and in full force and effect.

SECTION 6. SUPERSEDER.

All code provisions, ordinances, resolutions, rules and orders, or parts thereof, in conflict herewith are, to the extent of such conflict, hereby superseded.

SECTION 7. PUBLICATION.

A full, true and complete copy of this Ordinance shall be published in pamphlet form or in a newspaper published and of general circulation within the Village as provided by the Illinois Municipal Code, as amended.

SECTION 8. EFFECTIVE DATE.

This Ordinance shall be effective and in full force immediately upon passage and approval.

EXHIBIT A

ORDINANCE NO. 2017-08

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 14, SECTIONS 14-84 OF THE MUNICIPAL CODE, VILLAGE OF STICKNEY, ILLINOIS REGARDING ONE-WAY ROADWAYS

WHEREAS, the Village of Stickney (the "Village") is a home rule municipal corporation in accordance with Article VII, Section 6(a) of the Constitution of the State of Illinois of 1970; and

WHEREAS, the Village has the authority to adopt ordinances and to promulgate rules and regulations that pertain to its government and affairs, and to review, interpret and amend its ordinances, rules and regulations; and

WHEREAS, the Village President (the "President") and the Board of Trustees of the Village (the "Village Board" and with the President, the "Corporate Authorities") are committed to ensuring the health, safety and welfare of Village residents; and

WHEREAS, currently 42nd Street, 43rd Street and 44th Street (collectively, the "Streets") allow for the movement of traffic in both eastbound and westbound directions; and

WHEREAS, construction in the area is anticipated to increase traffic flow on the Streets; and

WHEREAS, in order to provide for the safe movement of vehicular and pedestrian traffic, the Corporate Authorities have determined that it is in the best interests of the Village and its residents to allow only westbound traffic on the Streets from Harlem Avenue to the alley located between Harlem and Maple Avenues; and

WHEREAS, it is understood that additional steps need to be taken to ensure that the traffic control signs are properly installed and maintained on the Streets; and

WHEREAS, based upon the foregoing, the Corporate Authorities have determined that it is necessary, advisable and in the best interests of the Village and its residents to amend Chapter 14, Section 14-84 of the Municipal Code, Village Of Stickney, Illinois (the "Village Code") as set forth below;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE PRESIDENT AND BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF STICKNEY, COOK COUNTY, ILLINOIS, as follows:

ARTICLE I. IN GENERAL

SECTION 1. INCORPORATION CLAUSE.

The Corporate Authorities hereby find that all of the recitals hereinbefore stated as contained in the preambles to this Ordinance are full, true and correct and do hereby, by reference, incorporate and make them part of this Ordinance as legislative findings.

SECTION 2. PURPOSE.

The purpose of this Ordinance is to amend Chapter 14, Section 14-84 of the Village Code to allow only westbound traffic on the Streets from Harlem Avenue to the alley located between Harlem and Maple Avenues and to authorize the President or his designee to take all actions necessary to carry out the intent of this Ordinance.

ARTICLE II. AMENDMENT OF CHAPTER 14, SECTION 14-84 OF THE MUNICIPAL CODE, VILLAGE OF STICKNEY, ILLINOIS

SECTION 3.0. AMENDMENT OF CHAPTER 14, SECTION 14-84.

That the Village Code is hereby amended, notwithstanding any provision, ordinance, resolution or Village Code section to the contrary, by amending Chapter 14, Section 14-84 as follows:

Sec. 14-84. – One-way roadways.

- (a) Upon a roadway designated and sign-posted for one-way traffic, a vehicle shall be driven only in the direction designated.
- (b) The following streets shall be one-way in the direction indicated:

<u>42nd Street, between Harlem Avenue and the alley located between Harlem and Maple Avenues will be westbound.</u>

43rd Street, between Scoville Avenue and East Avenue will be westbound.

<u>43rd Street, between Harlem Avenue and the alley located between Harlem and Maple Avenues will be westbound.</u>

<u>44th Street, between Harlem Avenue and the alley located between Harlem and Maple Avenues will be westbound.</u>

Clarence Avenue, between 39th Street and 41st Street, southbound.

Clinton Avenue, between 39th Street and 45th Street, northbound.

East Avenue, between 43rd Street and 41st Street, northbound.

Elmwood Avenue between 39th Street and 43rd Street, northbound.

Euclid Avenue between 39th Street and 41st Street, southbound.

Grove Avenue between 45th Street and the south line of the first alley south of 39th Street, southbound.

Gunderson Avenue, between 39th Street and 43rd Street, southbound.

Home Avenue, between 39th Street and 45th Street, southbound.

Maple Avenue between 41st Street and 45th Street, northbound.

Scoville Avenue, between 39th Street and 41st Street, northbound.

Scoville Avenue, between 41st Street and 43rd Street, southbound.

Wenonah Avenue between 41st Street and 45th Street, northbound.

Wesley Avenue, between 39th Street and 41st Street, northbound.

Wisconsin Avenue between 41st Street and 45th Street, southbound.

(c) The following alleys shall be one way in the direction indicated:

The north and south public alley located in the block bounded by Harlem Avenue on the west, Wisconsin Avenue on the east, 40th Street on the north and 40th Place on the south, northbound.

The north and south public alley located in the block bounded by Harlem Avenue on the west, Wisconsin Avenue on the east, 40th Place on the north and 41st Street on the south, northbound.

The east and west bound public alley located at the rear of the Stickney Village Hall and Police Station bounded by Scoville Avenue on the east and East Avenue on the west, eastbound.

SECTION 3.1. OTHER ACTIONS AUTHORIZED.

The officers, employees and/or agents of the Village shall take all action necessary or reasonably required to carry out, give effect to and consummate the amendments contemplated by this Ordinance, including taking all necessary steps to ensure the proper installation and continuing maintenance of the traffic control signs located on the Streets, and shall take all action necessary in conformity therewith. The officers, employees and/or agents of the Village are specifically authorized and directed to draft and disseminate any and all necessary forms or notices to be utilized in connection with the intent of this Ordinance.

ARTICLE III. HEADINGS, SAVINGS CLAUSES, PUBLICATION, EFFECTIVE DATE

SECTION 4. HEADINGS.

The headings of the articles, sections, paragraphs and subparagraphs of this Ordinance are inserted solely for the convenience of reference and form no substantive part of this Ordinance nor should they be used in any interpretation or construction of any substantive provision of this Ordinance.

SECTION 5. SEVERABILITY.

The provisions of this Ordinance are hereby declared to be severable and should any provision of this Ordinance be determined to be in conflict with any law, statute or regulation by a court of competent jurisdiction, said provision shall be excluded and deemed inoperative, unenforceable and as though not provided for herein and all other provisions shall remain unaffected, unimpaired, valid and in full force and effect.

SECTION 6. SUPERSEDER.

All code provisions, ordinances, resolutions, rules and orders, or parts thereof, in conflict herewith are, to the extent of such conflict, hereby superseded.

SECTION 7. PUBLICATION.

A full, true and complete copy of this Ordinance shall be published in pamphlet form or in a newspaper published and of general circulation within the Village as provided by the Illinois Municipal Code, as amended.

SECTION 8. EFFECTIVE DATE.

This Ordinance shall be effective and in full force ten (10) days after its passage and approval.

ORDINANCE NO. 2017-09

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 86, SECTION 86-121 OF THE MUNICIPAL CODE, VILLAGE OF STICKNEY, ILLINOIS REGARDING WATER RATES

WHEREAS, the Village of Stickney (the "Village") is a home rule municipal corporation in accordance with Article VII, Section 6(a) of the Constitution of the State of Illinois of 1970; and

WHEREAS, the Village has the authority to adopt ordinances and to promulgate rules and regulations that pertain to its government and affairs, and to review, interpret and amend its ordinances, rules and regulations; and

WHEREAS, the Village President (the "President") and the Board of Trustees of the Village (the "Village Board" and with the President, the "Corporate Authorities") are committed to ensuring the health, safety and welfare of Village residents; and

WHEREAS, Section 11-139-8 of the Illinois Municipal Code (65 ILCS 5/11-139-8) authorizes municipalities operating combined waterworks and sewage systems to establish, revise and maintain rates as compensation for the use and operation of the combined waterworks and sewage systems; and

WHEREAS, currently, the Municipal Code, Village Of Stickney, Illinois (the "Village Code") sets forth the rates for water and water service within the Village; and

WHEREAS, the City of Chicago (the "City") enacted a series of annual increases to the water rates it charges suburban consumers, including the Village; and

WHEREAS, based on the City's annual water rate increases, the Village will be required to increase local water rates; and

WHEREAS, beginning in 2016, the City began increasing water rates annually in an amount equal to the increase in inflation as determined by the Consumer Price Index - Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (Chicago All Items) published by the United States Bureau of Labor Statistics for the 365-day period ending on the most recent January 1 (the "CPI"): and

WHEREAS, based on the foregoing, the Corporate Authorities have determined that it is in the best interests of the Village and its residents to amend the water rates to reflect the increased water fees charged by the City and to adjust water rates each year thereafter in accordance with the CPI; and

WHEREAS, based upon the foregoing, the Corporate Authorities have determined that it is necessary, advisable and in the best interests of the Village and its residents to amend Chapter 86, Section 86-121 of the Village Code as set forth below;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE PRESIDENT AND BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF STICKNEY, COOK COUNTY, ILLINOIS, as follows:

ARTICLE I. IN GENERAL

SECTION 1. INCORPORATION CLAUSE.

The Corporate Authorities hereby find that all of the recitals hereinbefore stated as contained in the preambles to this Ordinance are full, true and correct and do hereby, by reference, incorporate and make them part of this Ordinance as legislative findings.

SECTION 2. PURPOSE.

The purpose of this Ordinance is to amend Chapter 86, Section 86-121 of the Village Code to amend the water rates within the Village and to authorize the President or his designee to take all actions necessary to carry out the intent of this Ordinance.

ARTICLE II. AMENDMENT OF CHAPTER 86, SECTION 86-121 OF THE MUNICIPAL CODE, VILLAGE OF STICKNEY, ILLINOIS

SECTION 3.0. AMENDMENT OF CHAPTER 86, SECTION 86-121.

That the Village Code is hereby amended, notwithstanding any provision, ordinance, resolution or Village Code section to the contrary, by amending Chapter 86, Section 86-121, which Section shall be amended as follows:

Sec. 86-121. - Established.

The following rates shall be charged for water:

(1) *Residential users:* Residential class of water users shall be defined as all residential premises served containing three or less fewer dwelling units. Bills of residential service shall be rendered on a bi-monthly basis as follows:

A minimum charge of \$42.00 effective January 1, 2012, \$48.00 effective January 1, 2014 and \$55.00 \$56.10 effective January 1, 2015 July 1, 2017 for the first 800 cubic feet, or any portion thereof, used for each two-month period, as indicated by meters; for all water consumed over 800 cubic feet of each two-month period, there shall be a charge of \$4.91 effective January 1, 2012, \$5.65 effective January 1, 2014 and \$6.50 \$6.63 effective January 1, 2015 July 1, 2017 per 100 cubic feet.

With regard to the rates set above for residential service, beginning January 1, 2018, and every year thereafter, the rates shall be adjusted upwards, if applicable, by applying to the previous year's rates the rate of inflation, calculated based on the Consumer Price Index - Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (Chicago All Items) published by the United States Bureau of Labor Statistics for the 365-day period ending on the most recent January 1. Any such annual increase, however, shall be capped at 105 percent of the previous year's rate.

(2) *Commercial users:* Commercial class of water users shall be defined as all business or commercial establishments, all residential premises containing four or more dwelling units, and all business and commercial establishments containing one

or more residential dwelling units. Bills for commercial services shall be rendered on a monthly basis as follows:

A minimum monthly charge of \$25.48 effective January 1, 2012, \$29.30 effective January 1, 2014, and \$33.70 \$35.05 effective January 1, 2015 July 1, 2017 for the first 400 cubic feet or any portion thereof, used for each monthly period as indicated by meters; for water consumed over 400 cubic feet for each monthly period, there shall be a charge of \$5.23 effective January 1, 2012, \$6.01 effective January 1, 2014 and \$6.91 \$7.19 effective January 1, 2015 July 1, 2017 per 100 cubic feet.

With regard to the rates set above for commercial service, beginning January 1, 2018, and every year thereafter, the rates shall be adjusted upwards, if applicable, by applying to the previous year's rates the rate of inflation, calculated based on the Consumer Price Index - Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (Chicago All Items) published by the United States Bureau of Labor Statistics for the 365-day period ending on the most recent January 1. Any such annual increase, however, shall be capped at 105 percent of the previous year's rate.

(3) *Industrial users:* Industrial class of water users shall be defined as all industries including establishments, except dwellings, located in the areas zoned as industrial districts in the village. Bills for industrial services shall be rendered on a monthly basis as follows:

A minimum charge of \$50.59 effective January 1, 2012, \$58.18 effective January 1, 2014 and \$66.91 \$69.69 effective January 1, 2015 July 1, 2017 for the first 600 cubic feet, or any portion thereof, used for each monthly period, as indicated by meters; for all water consumed over 600 cubic feet for each monthly period, there shall be a charge of \$7.95 effective January 1, 2012, \$9.14 effective January 1, 2014 and \$10.51 \$10.93 effective January 1, 2015 July 1, 2017 per 100 cubic feet.

(4) *Special accounts:* Any consumer who uses in excess of 50,000 cubic feet of water per month, the rate of said consumer shall be \$40.50 effective January 1, 2012, \$46.58 effective January 1, 2014 and \$53.57 \$55.71 effective January 1, 2015 July 1, 2017 per 1,000 cubic feet.

With regard to the rates set above for industrial service, beginning January 1, 2018, and every year thereafter, the rates shall be adjusted upwards, if applicable, by applying to the previous year's rates the rate of inflation, calculated based on the Consumer Price Index - Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (Chicago All Items) published by the United States Bureau of Labor Statistics for the 365-day period ending on the most recent January 1. Any such annual increase, however, shall be capped at 105 percent of the previous year's rate.

(5) *Liability for service and penalty for late payment:* The owner of the premises, the occupant thereof and user of the services shall be jointly and severally liable to pay the water service on such premise. A penalty of ten percent shall be added to all bills not paid within the allowable time. When a date of billing is on a weekend or a legal holiday, then such bills shall be payable on the next succeeding business day, without any additional penalty.

(6) Unmetered use: Where water has not been controlled by meters or where it shall be found that the meters are registering incorrectly, or have stopped registering, the quantity of water used, or to be used, shall be estimated by the committee on water and charged in the manner and at the rates prescribed in this section: provided however, that the minimum charge shall not be less than the minimum charges set forth in this section. The village reserves the right to make such reasonable changes in the rates and in conditions established in this section, and to establish further rules and regulations from time to time, as may be found expeditious or necessary.

SECTION 3.1. OTHER ACTIONS AUTHORIZED.

The officers, employees and/or agents of the Village shall take all action necessary or reasonably required to carry out, give effect to and consummate the amendments contemplated by this Ordinance and shall take all action necessary in conformity therewith. The officers, employees and/or agents of the Village are specifically authorized and directed to draft and disseminate any and all necessary forms or notices to be utilized in connection with the intent of this Ordinance.
