ORDINANCE NO. 2020-06

AN ORDINANCE DECLARING A LOCAL EMERGENCY AND AUTHORIZING EMERGENCY POWERS RELATING TO THE IMPACT OF CORONAVIRUS DISEASE 2019 (COVID-19) FOR THE VILLAGE OF STICKNEY, COUNTY OF COOK, STATE OF ILLINOIS.

WHEREAS, the Village of Stickney (the "Village") is a home rule municipal corporation in accordance with Article VII, Section 6(a) of the Constitution of the State of Illinois of 1970; and

WHEREAS, the Village has the authority to adopt ordinances and to promulgate rules and regulations that pertain to its government and affairs, and to review, interpret and amend its ordinances, rules and regulations; and

WHEREAS, the Village President (the "President") and the Board of Trustees of the Village (the "Village Board" and with the President, the "Corporate Authorities") are committed to ensuring the health, safety and welfare of individuals residing in, working in and visiting the Village; and

WHEREAS, in late 2019, a new and significant outbreak of Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19) emerged in and around Wuhan, China; and

WHEREAS, COVID-19 is a novel severe acute respiratory illness that can spread among people through respiratory transmissions and present with symptoms similar to those of influenza; and

WHEREAS, certain populations are at higher risk of experiencing more severe illness as a result of COVID-19, including older adults and people who have serious chronic medical conditions or compromised immune systems such as heart disease, cancer, diabetes, lung disease and other diseases or conditions; and

WHEREAS, on January 30, 2020, the World Health Organization declared the outbreak of COVID-19 to be a public health emergency of international concern and on March 11, 2020 declared a worldwide pandemic; and

WHEREAS, on January 31, 2020, the U.S. Health and Human Services Secretary declared a public health emergency for the United States; and

WHEREAS, on March 9, 2020, Governor J.B Pritzker issued a disaster proclamation due to the impact of the COVID-19 virus and has activated the State Emergency Operations Center by issuing this declaration, the Governor is possessed with the full authority to take extraordinary steps to remedy the emergency; and

WHEREAS, despite efforts to contain COVID-19, the World Health Organization and the United States Center for Disease Control and Prevention ("CDC") indicate that it is expected to spread; and

WHEREAS, on March 13, 2020, President Donald Trump issued a proclamation declaring a national emergency concerning the COVID-19 outbreak; and

WHEREAS, on March 13, 2020, Governor Pritzker issued an executive order mandating that all K through 12 private and public schools shall be closed starting on March 17, 2020, as well as issuing certain directives and prohibitions related to public gatherings of people; and

WHEREAS, on March 15, 2020, Governor Pritzker further ordered that all bars and restaurants be closed for in-person dining and further encouraged more social distancing; and

WHEREAS, on March 20, 2020, Governor Pritzker issued Executive Order No. 2020-10, which, among other things, issued a "stay at home order" until April 7, 2020; and

WHEREAS, Governor Pritzker has since issued multiple executive orders related to the COVID-19 pandemic and has stated that the "stay at home order" may need to be extended; and

WHEREAS, on March 29, 2020, President Donald Trump extended certain social distancing guidelines until at least April 30, 2020, including but not limited to gathering in groups of ten (10) or more; and

WHEREAS, on March 31, 2020, Governor Pritzker extended the "stay at home order" until April 30, 2020; and

WHEREAS, it is plainly apparent that the situation surrounding the COVID-19 pandemic is quickly evolving and the mandates and recommendations from the federal and state levels continue to change and as such, units of local governments must be prepared to act quickly to institute certain measures to contain COVID-19 while still providing certain essential services and conducting certain essential business functions of the units of local government; and

WHEREAS, based on the foregoing, the circumstances surrounding COVID-19 constitute a public health emergency as defined under Section 4 of the Illinois Emergency Management Agency Act (20 ILCS 3305/4); and

WHEREAS, the State Emergency Management Agency has declared a public health emergency due to the impact of the COVID-19 virus; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to this Ordinance, the Corporate Authorities hereby issue a Declaration of Emergency due to the impact of the COVID-19 virus effective immediately; and

WHEREAS, the Village Administration has coordinated the Village's response to the COVID-19 virus with other governmental entities and has developed certain temporary policies related to the public's interactions with the Village and COVID-19's impact on employees (the "Policies"). Said Policies are attached hereto as "Exhibit A" and are fully incorporated herein; and

WHEREAS, Section 11 of the Illinois Emergency Management Agency Act (20 ILCS 3305/11), Section 11-1-6 of the Illinois Municipal Code (65 ILCS 5/11-1-6) and Chapter 26 of the Village of Stickney Code of Ordinances (the "Village Code") empowers the Village with certain emergency authorities; and

WHEREAS, the CDC currently recommends community preparedness and everyday prevention measures be taken by all individuals and families in the United States, including voluntary home isolation when individuals are sick with respiratory symptoms, covering coughs and sneezes with a tissue, washing hands often with soap and water for at least twenty (20) seconds, use of alcohol-based hand sanitizers with at least sixty percent (60%) alcohol if soap and water are not readily available, and routinely cleaning frequently touched surfaces and objects to increase community resilience and readiness for responding to an outbreak; and

WHEREAS, the Corporate Authorities have considered the existence of a public health emergency in acting upon this Ordinance and taking additional actions required to promote the health, safety and welfare of its citizens, including but not limited to the adoption of the Policies;

and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE PRESIDENT AND BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF STICKNEY, COOK COUNTY, ILLINOIS, as follows:

SECTION 1: The Corporate Authorities hereby find that all of the recitals hereinbefore stated as contained in the preambles to this Ordinance are full, true and correct and do hereby, by reference, incorporate and make them part of this Ordinance as legislative findings.

SECTION 2: Declaration of Emergency. This Ordinance shall be construed as a declaration of an emergency pursuant to Section 11-1-6 of the Illinois Municipal Code (65 ILCS 5/11-1-6) as well as a local disaster pursuant to Section 11 of the Illinois Emergency Management Agency Act (20 ILCS 3305/11). Upon the approval and execution of this Ordinance and any extension thereof, this Ordinance shall constitute a statement required by Section 11 of the Illinois Emergency Management Agency Act (20 ILCS 3305/11) signed under oath by the President finding this Ordinance properly describes the nature of the emergency herein and the standards necessary to find the existence of a local emergency have been met, and a declaration that a state of emergency continues to exist.

SECTION 3: Village Board Meetings. Any regular or special meetings of the Village Board may be conducted at the call of the President or two (2) Village Board members in accordance with the Illinois Open Meetings Act, Executive Order No. 2020-07, as may be amended and supplemented, and such other executive orders, rules and regulations governing open meetings. While this Ordinance remains in effect, all such meetings shall be considered "emergency meetings" under the law. During this period of emergency, Village Rules are hereby modified to require an affirmative vote of a majority of the Corporate Authorities present, electronically or physically, at the meeting for the passage of any resolution, ordinance or direction to Village staff.

SECTION 4: Meetings of Village Boards and Commissions. The President may cancel meetings of any Village board or commission to which the President appoints members. Any such cancellation shall automatically extend such deadlines for required actions by such Village board or commission as is specified in the cancellation notice.

SECTION 5: Control of Events and Activities. The President may suspend, restrict or limit events, business or other activities regardless if such events or activities are licensed or permitted when such events or activities are barred or discouraged by the State or Federal government or when in the Village President's judgement said event or activity could impact public health or well-being of residents or visitors to the community.

SECTION 6: Purchases. The President may authorize any purchase for which funds are available reasonably related to the emergency unless doing so would violate Section 8-9-1 of the Illinois Municipal Code (65 ILCS 5/8-9-1). Any purchases made pursuant to this Section shall be presented to the Village Board for approval at the first regular Village Board meeting following the Governor's lifting of the state disaster proclamation.

SECTION 7: Personnel Policies. The President is hereby authorized to adjust any personnel policies related to leave time, other benefits or terms and conditions of employment as are reasonably related to providing sufficient staffing during the term of the emergency, and to establish administrative rules and procedures for the continuation of Village employee wages and benefits in the event that an employee of the Village is exposed to COVID-19 or the Village employee must care for an immediate family member who shares the same household who is

exposed to COVID-19 for up to fourteen (14) days as established by the CDC.

SECTION 8: Bargaining Units. The President is hereby authorized to enter into such temporary agreements, including memoranda of understanding with the Village's bargaining units in order to promote the provision of Village services and the health and safety of the public and employees during the emergency.

SECTION 9: Village Facilities and Services. The President is hereby authorized to close Village facilities and modify or suspend Village services as is reasonably required to protect the health of the public and employees of the Village.

SECTION 10: Ordinance Violations. The President is hereby authorized to modify any timeframe for or relating to the filing of Village ordinance violations in recognition of the emergency.

SECTION 11: Amounts Due and Owning. The President, upon the recommendation of the Finance Director or other professional retained by the Village to advise and assist the Village related to financial matters, is hereby authorized to extend deadlines and waive late fees and related charges for payment related to any amounts due and owing to the Village and to suspend shutting the water off for those who have not paid bills.

SECTION 12: Other Emergency Powers. The President may issue such orders, which shall have the force of law, which may include without limitation the following:

- A. Temporarily close any and all streets, alleys, sidewalks, bike paths, public parks or public ways.
- B. Temporarily suspend or modify, the enforcement of any regulation or ordinance of the Village, including, but not limited to, those regarding health, safety, and zoning.
- C. Order a curfew for some or all persons.
- D. Suspend or limit the use of the water resources or other infrastructure.
- E. Control, restrict, allocate, or regulate the use, sale, production, or distribution of food, water, fuel, clothing, and/or other commodities, materials, goods, services and resources.
- F. Approve application for local, state, or federal assistance.
- G. Establish and control routes of transportation, ingress or egress.
- H. Approve the transfer, the direction, personnel, or functions of Village departments and agencies for the purpose of performing or facilitating emergency or disaster services.
- I. Accept services, gifts, grants, loans, equipment, supplies, facilities and/or materials whether from private, nonprofit, or governmental sources, in accordance with the law.
- J. Enter into Intergovernmental Agreements with other units of local government for the sharing of governmental resources including, but not limited to, buildings, facilities, equipment and supplies.

- K. Declare, issue, enforce, modify and terminate orders for quarantine and isolation of persons posing a threat to the public.
- L. Exercise such powers and functions in light of the exigencies of emergency or disaster including the waiving of compliance with any time-consuming procedures and formalities and notices.
- M. Issue any and all such other orders or undertake such other functions and activities as the President reasonably believes is required to protect the health, safety, and welfare of persons or property within the Village or otherwise preserve the public peace or abate, clean up, or mitigate the effects of any emergency or disaster.

SECTION 13: Absence or Incapacity. In the absence or incapacity of the President, the President's designee(s) may exercise any authority granted to the President in this Ordinance.

SECTION 14: Designation of Authority. The President may designate his authorities provided by this Ordinance to such individuals and departments as he deems necessary.

SECTION 15: Authority. The authorizations granted to the President and the President's designee(s) in this Ordinance may be used or not used by the President and the President's designee(s) in their absolute discretion based on the circumstances and information then available. Said authorizations are not intended to automatically or permanently provide additional benefits, rights, responsibilities or restrictions for Village staff, officials, representatives, residents, or for any other person or persons.

SECTION 16: Policies. The Corporate Authorities hereby adopt the Policies, as set forth in Exhibit A.

SECTION 17: Invalidity. If any section, paragraph, clause or provision of this Ordinance shall be held invalid, the invalidity thereof shall not affect any of the other provisions herein. In the event of an inconsistency between this Ordinance and any other ordinances, resolutions or adopted motions, this Ordinance shall be controlling.

SECTION 18: Duration. As an exercise of the Village's home rule powers, this Ordinance and any related declaration of a state of emergency shall be effective immediately and unless it is repealed, modified or extended by a majority vote of the Corporate Authorities present either physically or electronically at a meeting of the Village Board, shall continue in full effect until the first regular meeting of the Corporate Authorities after the Governor of the State of Illinois lifts the State of Illinois' state of emergency related to the COVID-19 crisis or otherwise modifies, repeals, replaces amends Executive Order 2020-10, a copy of which is attached hereto and incorporated herein as Exhibit B, or if the Governor issues any subsequent orders inapposite to this Ordinance and any related declaration of a state of emergency. To the extent necessary and allowed by law, the declaration of a state of emergency and this Ordinance is re-proclaimed and redeclared as often as necessary to ensure that the municipality acknowledges the conditions of emergency until the adjournment of the first regular meeting of the Corporate Authorities after the Governor of the State of Illinois lifts the State of Illinois' state of emergency related to the COVID-19 crisis.

THE VILLAGE OF STICKNEY

COVID-19 PANDEMIC EMERGENCY POLICY

The COVID-19 pandemic is an unprecedented event in the United States. The COVID-19 pandemic has already disrupted our daily lives with school closures, restaurants closures and limitations, grocery shortages, and a strong recommendation regarding social distancing. The situation is fluid and additional closures and social limitations may be implemented in the days to come. The Village of Stickney is working with federal, state and local officials in an attempt to limit the impact and spread of the COVID-19 virus. As a result, during this pandemic, the following policies and procedures will be implemented. These emergency policies and procedures shall apply at least until April 30, 2020 and may further be extended depending on the status of the COVID-19 pandemic. In the least, these policies shall remain in place until the “stay at home order” in Governor J.B. Pritzker’s Executive Order No. 2020-10 and extended until April 30, 2020 is lifted.

For general information about the COVID-19 pandemic, among other resources, the Illinois Department of Public Health has a statewide COVID-19 hotline and website to answer any questions from the public or to report a suspected case: call 1-800-889-3931 or visit www.IDPH.illinois.gov. We recommend you review this website or call the hotline for initial research on the topic.

The policy below addresses two areas: (1) the public’s interactions with the Village of Stickney; and (2) employees working for the Village of Stickney.

A. The Public’s Interactions with the Village of Stickney

In normal times, the Village of Stickney strongly encourages public participation and use of certain municipal services. However, the COVID-19 pandemic and the guidance given by the Center for Disease Control (the “CDC”) and the Office of the Illinois Governor have taken certain measures to limit social interaction and have strongly encouraged social distancing. As a result, the Village of Stickney is implementing the following measures as it relates to interactions with the public during this unprecedented event:

1. The public is strongly encouraged to limit their in-person interactions with all persons and specifically, with personnel of the Village of Stickney. All water bills, refuse bills, or other Village related bills may be paid online or over the phone. The website for online payments is: www.villageofstickney.com. Those unable to pay online may call in their payments to the Village of Stickney at (708) 749-4400.
 2. No late fees will be assessed and no services will be shutoff or discontinued, including water and refuse collection services, for nonpayment through at least April 30, 2020.
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The Village of Stickney reserves the right to extend this timeframe as the COVID-19 pandemic evolves.

3. While all public meetings remain open to the public in compliance with the Illinois Open Meetings Act, the public is strongly encouraged to weigh the benefit of their attendance at said meetings against the possibility of exposure to COVID-19 and the federal and state recommendations regarding social distancing. Through at least April 30, 2020, the Village of Stickney will accept public comment electronically. All public comments must be sent to the Village Clerk no later than one (1) hour before the start time of the meeting. The public is strongly encouraged to utilize the electronic public comment mechanism to avoid exposure to potentially infected individuals and to stave off the spread of COVID-19 by unsuspecting carriers. The public may still attend public meetings and offer public comment in person as allowed by the Open Meetings Act however, the Village of Stickney strongly encourages and recommends the use of the electronic public comment system.
4. To minimize exposure to COVID-19 and in an effort to employ the principles of social distancing, the Village of Stickney will be operating with a reduced staff in non-emergency services departments. The departments of Police, Fire, Public Works, and Emergency Services will operate at full capacity. All employees who exhibits signs or symptoms, or have been exposed to COVID-19 will be asked to not report to work or will be sent home. The Village of Stickney requests your patience during this trying time.
5. All employees of the Village of Stickney have been or will be educated on proper sanitation procedures, including frequent handwashing, not touching one's face, and isolating or quarantining themselves if they exhibit COVID-19 symptoms or have been exposed to someone who has been exposed to or is suffering from COVID-19.
6. As this situation is fluid, additional emergency procedures may be implemented. Notice of any such changes will be posted on the Village of Stickney's website in a timely manner. Please be patient and understanding during this unprecedented time.

B. Employees of the Village of Stickney

1. All employees of the Village of Stickney are encouraged to stay home if they exhibit any signs or symptoms of COVID-19 or if they have been exposed to someone who may be a carrier of COVID-19. The CDC reports that social distancing is key to stopping the spread of COVID-19. Any employee who reports to work showing signs or symptoms of COVID-19 will be sent home immediately and may be required to self-quarantine for a period of at least fourteen (14) days. Unless otherwise required by law or executive order by the President of the United States or the Governor of the State of Illinois, employees will not be paid for time missed at work as a result of COVID-19 after exhausting time.

2. All employees are mandated to immediately report any contact with persons who have been diagnosed with COVID-19 to their immediate supervisor and to the Administrative Assistant to the Mayor, Beth Lukas., _____. Employees in contact with persons who have been diagnosed with COVID-19 may be required to self-quarantine for a period of fourteen (14) days.
3. All employees must report any travel to high-risk and/or Level 3 risk areas as identified by the CDC. Level 3 risk areas and other high-risk travel areas can be found on the CDC's website at: <https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/travelers/after-travel-precautions.html>. At the time of the drafting of this policy, these Level 3 areas include most of Europe, the United Kingdom, Ireland, China, Iran, and South Korea. These Level 3 risk areas may increase or otherwise be expanded as the situation develops. Employees who have traveled to Level 3 risk areas may be requested to self-quarantine for a period of fourteen (14) days.
4. Any employees who have been out of work sick with COVID-19 or any other serious or contagious illness may be required to present a physician's release and statement before they are allowed to return to work.
5. Employees are also requested to report any travel within the United States. As additional "hot spots" develop nationwide, the Village of Stickney wants to be aware of travel to any of these areas. Employees who have traveled to certain "hot spots" may also be requested to self-quarantine for a period of fourteen (14) days.
6. The Village of Stickney is reviewing procedures to allow certain employees to work remotely. If the Village of Stickney is equipped and able to allow employees to work remotely, those employees are expected to perform the duties assigned to them to the best of their abilities.
7. Should the Village of Stickney determine that it needs to close or further shutdown or limit operations and if it determines that certain categories of employees should not physically report to work, the employees shall be paid all of, none of or a portion of their salary in accordance with state and federal laws and mandates and Village of Stickney policy.
8. Employees who receive healthcare benefits through the Village of Stickney, shall keep their benefits, regardless of whether the employee is working, through at least April 30, 2020. The Village of Stickney reserves the right to extend this timeframe as the COVID-19 pandemic evolves.
9. Employees who are not able to or willing to come to work, have been ordered to stay home or are exhibiting symptoms, are entitled to utilize any and all accrued time due including, but not limited to, sick time, compensatory time, time due, and vacation time. Upon expiration of time due, an employee who qualifies may apply for FMLA. Thereafter, an employee not exhibiting symptoms will be required to return to work. Employees who are not able to return to work for medical reasons will be subject to the

Village's FLMA policies. The unions are encouraged to communicate with the Village of Stickney electronically if there are any concerns regarding these policies and are also asked to be patient and understanding during this unprecedented world-wide event.

10. Employees may also be eligible for leave under the Family Medical Leave Act for COVID-19 to care for themselves or an immediate family member. Please contact your department head and the Administrative Assistant to the Mayor, Beth Lukas, to discuss your FMLA needs.
11. Some employees may be eligible for unemployment benefits during the COVID-19 pandemic. Please visit the Illinois Department of Employment Security's website to review your eligibility for unemployment benefits.

Executive Order 2020-10

EXECUTIVE ORDER IN RESPONSE TO COVID-19
(COVID-19 EXECUTIVE ORDER NO. 8)

WHEREAS, I, JB Pritzker, Governor of Illinois, declared all counties in the State of Illinois as a disaster area on March 9, 2020 (Gubernatorial Disaster Proclamation) in response to the outbreak of Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19); and,

WHEREAS, in a short period of time, COVID-19 has rapidly spread throughout Illinois, necessitating updated and more stringent guidance from federal, state, and local public health officials; and,

WHEREAS, for the preservation of public health and safety throughout the entire State of Illinois, and to ensure that our healthcare delivery system is capable of serving those who are sick, I find it necessary to take additional measures consistent with public health guidance to slow and stop the spread of COVID-19;

WHEREAS, COVID-19 has resulted in significant economic impact, including loss of income and wages, that threaten to undermine housing security and stability;

WHEREAS, the enforcement of eviction orders for residential premises is contrary to the interest of preserving public health and ensuring that individuals remain in their homes during this public health emergency;

THEREFORE, by the powers vested in me as the Governor of the State of Illinois, and pursuant to Sections 7(1), 7(2), 7(8), 7(10), and 7(12) of the Illinois Emergency Management Agency Act, 20 ILCS 3305, and consistent with the powers in public health laws, I hereby order the following, effective March 21, 2020 at 5:00 pm and for the remainder of the duration of the Gubernatorial Disaster Proclamation, which currently extends through April 7, 2020:

Section 1. Stay at Home; Social Distancing Requirements; and Essential Businesses and Operations

1. **Stay at home or place of residence.** With exceptions as outlined below, all individuals currently living within the State of Illinois are ordered to stay at home or at their place of residence except as allowed in this Executive Order. To the extent individuals are using shared or outdoor spaces when outside their residence, they must at all times and as much as reasonably possible maintain social distancing of at least six feet from any other person, consistent with the Social Distancing Requirements set forth in this Executive Order. All persons may leave their homes or place of residence only for Essential Activities, Essential Governmental Functions, or to operate Essential Businesses and Operations, all as defined below.

Individuals experiencing homelessness are exempt from this directive, but are strongly urged to obtain shelter, and governmental and other entities are strongly urged to make

such shelter available as soon as possible and to the maximum extent practicable (and to use in their operation COVID-19 risk mitigation practices recommended by the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and the Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH)). Individuals whose residences are unsafe or become unsafe, such as victims of domestic violence, are permitted and urged to leave their home and stay at a safe alternative location. For purposes of this Executive Order, homes or residences include hotels, motels, shared rental units, shelters, and similar facilities.

2. **Non-essential business and operations must cease.** All businesses and operations in the State, except Essential Businesses and Operations as defined below, are required to cease all activities within the State except Minimum Basic Operations, as defined below. For clarity, businesses may also continue operations consisting exclusively of employees or contractors performing activities at their own residences (i.e., working from home).

All Essential Businesses and Operations are encouraged to remain open. To the greatest extent feasible, Essential Businesses and Operations shall comply with Social Distancing Requirements as defined in this Executive Order, including by maintaining six-foot social distancing for both employees and members of the public at all times, including, but not limited to, when any customers are standing in line.

3. **Prohibited activities.** All public and private gatherings of any number of people occurring outside a single household or living unit are prohibited, except for the limited purposes permitted by this Executive Order. Pursuant to current guidance from the CDC, any gathering of more than ten people is prohibited unless exempted by this Executive Order. Nothing in this Executive Order prohibits the gathering of members of a household or residence.

All places of public amusement, whether indoors or outdoors, including but not limited to, locations with amusement rides, carnivals, amusement parks, water parks, aquariums, zoos, museums, arcades, fairs, children's play centers, playgrounds, funplexes, theme parks, bowling alleys, movie and other theaters, concert and music halls, and country clubs or social clubs shall be closed to the public.

This Executive Order supersedes Section 2 of Executive Order 2020-07 (COVID-19 Executive Order No. 5), which prohibited gatherings of 50 people or more.

4. **Prohibited and permitted travel.** All travel, including, but not limited to, travel by automobile, motorcycle, scooter, bicycle, train, plane, or public transit, except Essential Travel and Essential Activities as defined herein, is prohibited. People riding on public transit must comply with Social Distancing Requirements to the greatest extent feasible. This Executive Order allows travel into or out of the State to maintain Essential Businesses and Operations and Minimum Basic Operations.
5. **Leaving the home for essential activities is permitted.** For purposes of this Executive Order, individuals may leave their residence only to perform any of the following Essential Activities:
 - a. **For health and safety.** To engage in activities or perform tasks essential to their health and safety, or to the health and safety of their family or household members (including, but not limited to, pets), such as, by way of example only and without limitation, seeking emergency services, obtaining medical supplies or medication, or visiting a health care professional.
 - b. **For necessary supplies and services.** To obtain necessary services or supplies for themselves and their family or household members, or to deliver those services or supplies to others, such as, by way of example only and without limitation, groceries and food, household consumer products, supplies they need

to work from home, and products necessary to maintain the safety, sanitation, and essential operation of residences.

- c. **For outdoor activity.** To engage in outdoor activity, provided the individuals comply with Social Distancing Requirements, as defined below, such as, by way of example and without limitation, walking, hiking, running, or biking. Individuals may go to public parks and open outdoor recreation areas. However, playgrounds may increase spread of COVID-19, and therefore shall be closed.
 - d. **For certain types of work.** To perform work providing essential products and services at Essential Businesses or Operations (which, as defined below, includes Healthcare and Public Health Operations, Human Services Operations, Essential Governmental Functions, and Essential Infrastructure) or to otherwise carry out activities specifically permitted in this Executive Order, including Minimum Basic Operations.
 - e. **To take care of others.** To care for a family member, friend, or pet in another household, and to transport family members, friends, or pets as allowed by this Executive Order.
6. **Elderly people and those who are vulnerable as a result of illness should take additional precautions.** People at high risk of severe illness from COVID-19, including elderly people and those who are sick, are urged to stay in their residence to the extent possible except as necessary to seek medical care. Nothing in this Executive Order prevents the Illinois Department of Public Health or local public health departments from issuing and enforcing isolation and quarantine orders pursuant to the Department of Public Health Act, 20 ILCS 2305.
7. **Healthcare and Public Health Operations.** For purposes of this Executive Order, individuals may leave their residence to work for or obtain services through Healthcare and Public Health Operations.

Healthcare and Public Health Operations includes, but is not limited to: hospitals; clinics; dental offices; pharmacies; public health entities, including those that compile, model, analyze and communicate public health information; pharmaceutical, pharmacy, medical device and equipment, and biotechnology companies (including operations, research and development, manufacture, and supply chain); organizations collecting blood, platelets, plasma, and other necessary materials; licensed medical cannabis dispensaries and licensed cannabis cultivation centers; reproductive health care providers; eye care centers, including those that sell glasses and contact lenses; home healthcare services providers; mental health and substance use providers; other healthcare facilities and suppliers and providers of any related and/or ancillary healthcare services; and entities that transport and dispose of medical materials and remains.

Specifically included in Healthcare and Public Health Operations are manufacturers, technicians, logistics, and warehouse operators and distributors of medical equipment, personal protective equipment (PPE), medical gases, pharmaceuticals, blood and blood products, vaccines, testing materials, laboratory supplies, cleaning, sanitizing, disinfecting or sterilization supplies, and tissue and paper towel products.

Healthcare and Public Health Operations also includes veterinary care and all healthcare services provided to animals.

Healthcare and Public Health Operations shall be construed broadly to avoid any impacts to the delivery of healthcare, broadly defined. Healthcare and Public Health Operations does not include fitness and exercise gyms, spas, salons, barber shops, tattoo parlors, and similar facilities.

8. **Human Services Operations.** For purposes of this Executive Order, individuals may leave their residence to work for or obtain services at any Human Services Operations, including any provider funded by the Illinois Department of Human Services, Illinois Department of Children and Family Services, or Medicaid that is providing services to the public and including state-operated, institutional, or community-based settings providing human services to the public.

Human Services Operations includes, but is not limited to: long-term care facilities; all entities licensed pursuant to the Child Care Act, 225 ILCS 10, except for day care centers, day care homes, group day care homes, and day care centers licensed as specified in Section 12(s) of this Executive Order; residential settings and shelters for adults, seniors, children, and/or people with developmental disabilities, intellectual disabilities, substance use disorders, and/or mental illness; transitional facilities; home-based settings to provide services to individuals with physical, intellectual, and/or developmental disabilities, seniors, adults, and children; field offices that provide and help to determine eligibility for basic needs including food, cash assistance, medical coverage, child care, vocational services, rehabilitation services; developmental centers; adoption agencies; businesses that provide food, shelter, and social services, and other necessities of life for economically disadvantaged individuals, individuals with physical, intellectual, and/or developmental disabilities, or otherwise needy individuals.

Human Services Operations shall be construed broadly to avoid any impacts to the delivery of human services, broadly defined.

9. **Essential Infrastructure.** For purposes of this Executive Order, individuals may leave their residence to provide any services or perform any work necessary to offer, provision, operate, maintain and repair Essential Infrastructure.

Essential Infrastructure includes, but is not limited to: food production, distribution, and sale; construction (including, but not limited to, construction required in response to this public health emergency, hospital construction, construction of long-term care facilities, public works construction, and housing construction); building management and maintenance; airport operations; operation and maintenance of utilities, including water, sewer, and gas; electrical (including power generation, distribution, and production of raw materials); distribution centers; oil and biofuel refining; roads, highways, railroads, and public transportation; ports; cybersecurity operations; flood control; solid waste and recycling collection and removal; and internet, video, and telecommunications systems (including the provision of essential global, national, and local infrastructure for computing services, business infrastructure, communications, and web-based services).

Essential Infrastructure shall be construed broadly to avoid any impacts to essential infrastructure, broadly defined.

10. **Essential Governmental Functions.** For purposes of this Executive Order, all first responders, emergency management personnel, emergency dispatchers, court personnel, law enforcement and corrections personnel, hazardous materials responders, child protection and child welfare personnel, housing and shelter personnel, military, and other governmental employees working for or to support Essential Businesses and Operations are categorically exempt from this Executive Order.

Essential Government Functions means all services provided by the State or any municipal, township, county, subdivision or agency of government and needed to ensure the continuing operation of the government agencies or to provide for or support the health, safety and welfare of the public, and including contractors performing Essential Government Functions. Each government body shall determine its Essential Governmental Functions and identify employees and/or contractors necessary to the performance of those functions.

This Executive Order does not apply to the United States government. Nothing in this Executive Order shall prohibit any individual from performing or accessing Essential Governmental Functions.

11. **Businesses covered by this Executive Order.** For the purposes of this Executive Order, covered businesses include any for-profit, non-profit, or educational entities, regardless of the nature of the service, the function it performs, or its corporate or entity structure.
12. **Essential Businesses and Operations.** For the purposes of this Executive Order, Essential Businesses and Operations means Healthcare and Public Health Operations, Human Services Operations, Essential Governmental Functions, and Essential Infrastructure, and the following:¹
 - a. **Stores that sell groceries and medicine.** Grocery stores, pharmacies, certified farmers' markets, farm and produce stands, supermarkets, convenience stores, and other establishments engaged in the retail sale of groceries, canned food, dry goods, frozen foods, fresh fruits and vegetables, pet supplies, fresh meats, fish, and poultry, alcoholic and non-alcoholic beverages, and any other household consumer products (such as cleaning and personal care products). This includes stores that sell groceries, medicine, including medication not requiring a medical prescription, and also that sell other non-grocery products, and products necessary to maintaining the safety, sanitation, and essential operation of residences and Essential Businesses and Operations;
 - b. **Food, beverage, and cannabis production and agriculture.** Food and beverage manufacturing, production, processing, and cultivation, including farming, livestock, fishing, baking, and other production agriculture, including cultivation, marketing, production, and distribution of animals and goods for consumption; licensed medical and adult use cannabis dispensaries and licensed cannabis cultivation centers; and businesses that provide food, shelter, and other necessities of life for animals, including animal shelters, rescues, shelters, kennels, and adoption facilities;
 - c. **Organizations that provide charitable and social services.** Businesses and religious and secular nonprofit organizations, including food banks, when providing food, shelter, and social services, and other necessities of life for economically disadvantaged or otherwise needy individuals, individuals who need assistance as a result of this emergency, and people with disabilities;
 - d. **Media.** Newspapers, television, radio, and other media services;
 - e. **Gas stations and businesses needed for transportation.** Gas stations and auto-supply, auto-repair, and related facilities and bicycle shops and related facilities;
 - f. **Financial institutions.** Banks, currency exchanges, consumer lenders, including but not limited, to payday lenders, pawnbrokers, consumer installment lenders and sales finance lenders, credit unions, appraisers, title companies, financial markets, trading and futures exchanges, affiliates of financial institutions, entities that issue bonds, related financial institutions, and institutions selling financial products;
 - g. **Hardware and supply stores.** Hardware stores and businesses that sell electrical, plumbing, and heating material;

¹ On March 19, 2020, the U.S. Department of Homeland Security, Cybersecurity & Infrastructure Security Agency, issued a *Memorandum on Identification of Essential Critical Infrastructure Workers During COVID-19 Response*. The definition of Essential Businesses and Operations in this Order is meant to encompass the workers identified in that Memorandum.

- h. **Critical trades.** Building and Construction Tradesmen and Tradeswomen, and other trades including but not limited to plumbers, electricians, exterminators, cleaning and janitorial staff for commercial and governmental properties, security staff, operating engineers, HVAC, painting, moving and relocation services, and other service providers who provide services that are necessary to maintaining the safety, sanitation, and essential operation of residences, Essential Activities, and Essential Businesses and Operations;
- i. **Mail, post, shipping, logistics, delivery, and pick-up services.** Post offices and other businesses that provide shipping and delivery services, and businesses that ship or deliver groceries, food, alcoholic and non-alcoholic beverages, goods or services to end users or through commercial channels;
- j. **Educational institutions.** Educational institutions—including public and private pre-K-12 schools, colleges, and universities—for purposes of facilitating distance learning, performing critical research, or performing essential functions, provided that social distancing of six-feet per person is maintained to the greatest extent possible. This Executive Order is consistent with and does not amend or supersede Executive Order 2020-05 (COVID-19 Executive Order No. 3) or Executive Order 2020-06 (COVID-19 Executive Order No. 4) except that affected schools are ordered closed through April 7, 2020;
- k. **Laundry services.** Laundromats, dry cleaners, industrial laundry services, and laundry service providers;
- l. **Restaurants for consumption off-premises.** Restaurants and other facilities that prepare and serve food, but only for consumption off-premises, through such means as in-house delivery, third-party delivery, drive-through, curbside pick-up, and carry-out. Schools and other entities that typically provide food services to students or members of the public may continue to do so under this Executive Order on the condition that the food is provided to students or members of the public on a pick-up and takeaway basis only. Schools and other entities that provide food services under this exemption shall not permit the food to be eaten at the site where it is provided, or at any other gathering site due to the virus's propensity to physically impact surfaces and personal property. This Executive Order is consistent with and does not amend or supersede Section 1 of Executive Order 2020-07 (COVID-19 Executive Order No. 5) except that Section 1 is ordered to be extended through April 7, 2020;
- m. **Supplies to work from home.** Businesses that sell, manufacture, or supply products needed for people to work from home;
- n. **Supplies for Essential Businesses and Operations.** Businesses that sell, manufacture, or supply other Essential Businesses and Operations with the support or materials necessary to operate, including computers, audio and video electronics, household appliances; IT and telecommunication equipment; hardware, paint, flat glass; electrical, plumbing and heating material; sanitary equipment; personal hygiene products; food, food additives, ingredients and components; medical and orthopedic equipment; optics and photography equipment; diagnostics, food and beverages, chemicals, soaps and detergent; and firearm and ammunition suppliers and retailers for purposes of safety and security;
- o. **Transportation.** Airlines, taxis, transportation network providers (such as Uber and Lyft), vehicle rental services, paratransit, and other private, public, and commercial transportation and logistics providers necessary for Essential Activities and other purposes expressly authorized in this Executive Order;

- p. **Home-based care and services.** Home-based care for adults, seniors, children, and/or people with developmental disabilities, intellectual disabilities, substance use disorders, and/or mental illness, including caregivers such as nannies who may travel to the child's home to provide care, and other in-home services including meal delivery;
- q. **Residential facilities and shelters.** Residential facilities and shelters for adults, seniors, children, and/or people with developmental disabilities, intellectual disabilities, substance use disorders, and/or mental illness;
- r. **Professional services.** Professional services, such as legal services, accounting services, insurance services, real estate services (including appraisal and title services);
- s. **Day care centers for employees exempted by this Executive Order.** Day care centers granted an emergency license pursuant to Title 89, Section 407.400 of the Illinois Administrative Code, governing Emergency Day Care Programs for children of employees exempted by this Executive Order to work as permitted. The licensing requirements for day care homes pursuant to Section 4 of the Child Care Act, 225 ILCS 10/4, are hereby suspended for family homes that receive up to 6 children for the duration of the Gubernatorial Disaster Proclamation.
- t. **Manufacture, distribution, and supply chain for critical products and industries.** Manufacturing companies, distributors, and supply chain companies producing and supplying essential products and services in and for industries such as pharmaceutical, technology, biotechnology, healthcare, chemicals and sanitization, waste pickup and disposal, agriculture, food and beverage, transportation, energy, steel and steel products, petroleum and fuel, mining, construction, national defense, communications, as well as products used by other Essential Businesses and Operations.
- u. **Critical labor union functions.** Labor Union essential activities including the administration of health and welfare funds and personnel checking on the well-being and safety of members providing services in Essential Businesses and Operations – provided that these checks should be done by telephone or remotely where possible.
- v. **Hotels and motels.** Hotels and motels, to the extent used for lodging and delivery or carry-out food services.
- w. **Funeral services.** Funeral, mortuary, cremation, burial, cemetery, and related services.

13. **Minimum Basic Operations.** For the purposes of this Executive Order, Minimum Basic Operations include the following, provided that employees comply with Social Distancing Requirements, to the extent possible, while carrying out such operations:

- a. The minimum necessary activities to maintain the value of the business's inventory, preserve the condition of the business's physical plant and equipment, ensure security, process payroll and employee benefits, or for related functions.
- b. The minimum necessary activities to facilitate employees of the business being able to continue to work remotely from their residences.

14. **Essential Travel.** For the purposes of this Executive Order, Essential Travel includes travel for any of the following purposes. Individuals engaged in any Essential Travel must comply with all Social Distancing Requirements as defined in this Section.

- a. Any travel related to the provision of or access to Essential Activities, Essential Governmental Functions, Essential Businesses and Operations, or Minimum Basic Operations.
- b. Travel to care for elderly, minors, dependents, persons with disabilities, or other vulnerable persons.
- c. Travel to or from educational institutions for purposes of receiving materials for distance learning, for receiving meals, and any other related services.
- d. Travel to return to a place of residence from outside the jurisdiction.
- e. Travel required by law enforcement or court order, including to transport children pursuant to a custody agreement.
- f. Travel required for non-residents to return to their place of residence outside the State. Individuals are strongly encouraged to verify that their transportation out of the State remains available and functional prior to commencing such travel.

15. **Social Distancing Requirements.** For purposes of this Executive Order, Social Distancing Requirements includes maintaining at least six-foot social distancing from other individuals, washing hands with soap and water for at least twenty seconds as frequently as possible or using hand sanitizer, covering coughs or sneezes (into the sleeve or elbow, not hands), regularly cleaning high-touch surfaces, and not shaking hands.

- a. **Required measures.** Essential Businesses and Operations and businesses engaged in Minimum Basic Operations must take proactive measures to ensure compliance with Social Distancing Requirements, including where possible:
 - i. **Designate six-foot distances.** Designating with signage, tape, or by other means six-foot spacing for employees and customers in line to maintain appropriate distance;
 - ii. **Hand sanitizer and sanitizing products.** Having hand sanitizer and sanitizing products readily available for employees and customers;
 - iii. **Separate operating hours for vulnerable populations.** Implementing separate operating hours for elderly and vulnerable customers; and
 - iv. **Online and remote access.** Posting online whether a facility is open and how best to reach the facility and continue services by phone or remotely.

16. **Intent of this Executive Order.** The intent of this Executive Order is to ensure that the maximum number of people self-isolate in their places of residence to the maximum extent feasible, while enabling essential services to continue, to slow the spread of COVID-19 to the greatest extent possible. When people need to leave their places of residence, whether to perform Essential Activities, or to otherwise facilitate authorized activities necessary for continuity of social and commercial life, they should at all times and as much as reasonably possible comply with Social Distancing Requirements. All provisions of this Executive Order should be interpreted to effectuate this intent.

17. **Enforcement.** This Executive Order may be enforced by State and local law enforcement pursuant to, *inter alia*, Section 7, Section 18, and Section 19 of the Illinois Emergency Management Agency Act, 20 ILCS 3305.

18. **No limitation on authority.** Nothing in this Executive Order shall, in any way, alter or modify any existing legal authority allowing the State or any county, or local government

body from ordering (1) any quarantine or isolation that may require an individual to remain inside a particular residential property or medical facility for a limited period of time, including the duration of this public health emergency, or (2) any closer of a specific location for a limited period of time, including the duration of this public health emergency. Nothing in this Executive Order shall, in any way, alter or modify any existing legal authority allowing a county or local government body to enact provisions that are stricter than those in this Executive Order.

Section 2. Order ceasing evictions.

Pursuant to the Illinois Emergency Management Agency Act, 20 ILCS 3305/7(2), (8), and (10), all state, county, and local law enforcement officers in the State of Illinois are instructed to cease enforcement of orders of eviction for residential premises for the duration of the Gubernatorial Disaster Proclamation. No provision contained in this Executive Order shall be construed as relieving any individual of the obligation to pay rent, to make mortgage payments, or to comply with any other obligation that an individual may have under tenancy or mortgage.

Section 3. Savings clause.

If any provision of this Executive Order or its application to any person or circumstance is held invalid by any court of competent jurisdiction, this invalidity does not affect any other provision or application of this Executive Order, which can be given effect without the invalid provision or application. To achieve this purpose, the provisions of this Executive Order are declared to be severable.

ORDINANCE NO. 2020-07

**AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 78, ARTICLE VII OF THE VILLAGE OF STICKNEY
MUNICIPAL CODE REGARDING RECREATIONAL CANNABIS TAXATION FOR THE
VILLAGE OF STICKNEY, COUNTY OF COOK, STATE OF ILLINOIS.**

WHEREAS, the Village of Stickney (the "Village") is a home rule municipal corporation in accordance with Article VII, Section 6(a) of the Constitution of the State of Illinois of 1970; and

WHEREAS, the Village has the authority to adopt ordinances and to promulgate rules and regulations that pertain to its government and affairs, and to review, interpret and amend its ordinances, rules and regulations; and

WHEREAS, the Village President (the "President") and the Board of Trustees of the Village (the "Village Board" and with the President, the "Corporate Authorities") are committed to ensuring the health, safety and welfare of individuals residing in, working in and visiting the Village; and

WHEREAS, the Village of Stickney Code of Ordinances (the "Village Code"), previously enacted regulations related to taxation (the "Existing Regulations"); and

WHEREAS, the Illinois General Assembly recently adopted the Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act (the "Act"), which legalizes the possession, sale and distribution of cannabis beginning January 1, 2020, in accordance with the Act (410 ILCS 705/1-1 et seq.); and

WHEREAS, the Illinois Generally Assembly also recently adopted the Municipal Cannabis Retailers' Occupation Tax Law, which authorizes the corporate authorities of local municipalities to impose, by ordinance, a tax upon all persons engaged in the business of selling cannabis, other than cannabis purchased under the Compassionate Use of Medical Cannabis Program Act, at retail in the municipality on the gross receipts from these sales made in the course of that business, in an amount not to exceed three percent (3%) of the gross receipts from these sales (65 ILCS 5/8-11-23); and

WHEREAS, the Corporate Authorities, in exercise of the power and authority reserved to them under the Municipal Cannabis Retailers' Occupation Tax Law, have determined that it is in the interest of the public health and public safety to impose a tax upon all persons engaged in the business of selling cannabis, other than cannabis purchased under the Compassionate Use of Medical Cannabis Program Act, at retail within the corporate limits of the Village on the gross receipts from these sales made in the course of that business, in an amount equal to three percent (3%) of the gross receipts from such sales; and

WHEREAS, the Corporate Authorities have determined that it is in the best interests of the public health, safety and welfare of the residents of the Village and the efficient operation of government to amend the Village Code to update the Existing Regulations; and

WHEREAS, in light of the foregoing, the Corporate Authorities have determined that it is necessary, advisable and in the best interests of the Village and its residents to amend Chapter 78, Article VII of the Village Code as set forth herein;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE PRESIDENT AND BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF STICKNEY, COOK COUNTY, ILLINOIS, as follows:

**ARTICLE I.
IN GENERAL**

SECTION 1. INCORPORATION CLAUSE.

The Corporate Authorities hereby find that all of the recitals hereinbefore stated as contained in the preambles to this Ordinance are full, true and correct and do hereby, by reference, incorporate and make them part of this Ordinance as legislative findings.

SECTION 2. PURPOSE.

The purpose of this Ordinance is to amend Chapter 78, Article VII of the Village Code to update, amend, and clarify the Village's existing regulations, and to authorize the President or his designee to take all actions necessary to carry out the intent of this Ordinance.

**ARTICLE II.
AMENDMENT OF CHAPTER 78, ARTICLE VII OF THE MUNICIPAL CODE,
VILLAGE OF STICKNEY, ILLINOIS**

SECTION 3.0 AMENDMENT OF CHAPTER 78, ARTICLE VII

That the Village Code is hereby amended, notwithstanding any provision, ordinance, resolution or Village Code section to the contrary, by amending Chapter 78, Article VII by striking out any language to be removed or repealed and underlining any new language as follows:

ARTICLE VII. – RESERVED RETAIL CANNABIS TAX

~~Secs. 78-221—78-240. – Reserved.~~

Sec. 78-221. – Imposed.

A tax is hereby imposed, in accordance with the Municipal Cannabis Retailers' Occupation Tax Law (65 ILCS 5/8-11-23), upon all persons engaged in the business of selling cannabis, other than cannabis purchased under the Compassionate Use of Medical Cannabis Program Act, at retail in the corporate limits of the village at the rate of 3% of the gross receipts from these sales made in the course of that business.

Sec. 78-222. – Collection and enforcement.

The tax imposed by this chapter, and all civil penalties that may be assessed as an incident thereto, shall be collected and enforced by the Illinois Department of Revenue. The Illinois Department of Revenue shall have full power to administer and enforce the provisions of this article. Any tax required to be collected pursuant to or as authorized by this article and any such tax collected by such retailer and required to be remitted to the Illinois Department of Revenue shall constitute a debt owed by the retailer to the State of Illinois. Retailers may reimburse themselves for their seller's tax liability hereunder by separately stating that tax as an additional charge, which charge may be stated in combination, in a single amount, with any state tax that sellers are required to collect, as provided in 65 ILCS 5/8-11-23.

Sec. 78-223. – Effective date.

The tax provided for in this article shall take effect for sales on or after the first day of July, 2020, or on or after such other date as provided for by 65 ILCS 5/8-11-23 or other applicable enactment of law.

Secs. 78-224—78-240. - Reserved.

SECTION 3.1. OTHER ACTIONS AUTHORIZED.

The officers, employees and/or agents of the Village shall take all action necessary or reasonably required to carry out, give effect to and consummate the amendments contemplated by this Ordinance and shall take all action necessary in conformity therewith. The officers, employees and/or agents of the Village are specifically authorized and directed to draft and disseminate any and all necessary forms or notices to be utilized in connection with the intent of this Ordinance. The Village Clerk shall cause a certified copy of this Ordinance to be filed with the Illinois Department of Revenue as soon as possible after approval of this Ordinance.

ARTICLE III. HEADINGS, SAVINGS CLAUSES, PUBLICATION, EFFECTIVE DATE

SECTION 4. HEADINGS.

The headings of the articles, sections, paragraphs and subparagraphs of this Ordinance are inserted solely for the convenience of reference and form no substantive part of this Ordinance nor should they be used in any interpretation or construction of any substantive provision of this Ordinance.

SECTION 5. SEVERABILITY.

The provisions of this Ordinance are hereby declared to be severable and should any provision of this Ordinance be determined to be in conflict with any law, statute or regulation by a court of competent jurisdiction, said provision shall be excluded and deemed inoperative, unenforceable and as though not provided for herein and all other provisions shall remain unaffected, unimpaired, valid and in full force and effect.

SECTION 6. SUPERSEDER.

All code provisions, ordinances, resolutions, rules and orders, or parts thereof, in conflict herewith are, to the extent of such conflict, hereby superseded.

SECTION 7. PUBLICATION.

A full, true and complete copy of this Ordinance shall be published in pamphlet form or in a newspaper published and of general circulation within the Village as provided by the Illinois Municipal Code, as amended.

SECTION 8. EFFECTIVE DATE.

This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect immediately, following its passage, approval and publication, as provided by law.
