**The Board of Trustees of the Village of Stickney met in regular session on Tuesday, June 2, 2015 at 7:04 p.m. in the Stickney Village Hall, 6533 W. Pershing Road, Stickney, Illinois.**

**Upon the roll call, the following Trustees were present:**

**Present: Trustees Hrejsa, Lazansky, Milenkovic, Savopoulos, and White**

**Absent: Trustee De Leshe**

**Trustee Lazansky moved, duly seconded by Trustee White, to approve the minutes of the previous regular session on Tuesday, May 19, 2015.**

**Upon the roll call, the following Trustees were present:**

**Present: Trustees Hrejsa, Lazansky, Milenkovic, Savopoulos, and White**

**Absent: Trustee De Leshe**

**President Morelli declared the motion carried.**

**Trustee White moved, duly seconded by Trustee Savopoulos that the bills, approved by the various committees of the Board, be approved for payment, and to approve warrants which authorize the Village Treasurer to draw checks to pay the bills, to be signed by the authorized signers, as provided for by the Ordinances of the Village of Stickney.**

**Upon the roll call, the following Trustees were present:**

**Present: Trustees Hrejsa, Lazansky, Milenkovic, Savopoulos, and White**

**Absent: Trustee De Leshe**

**President Morelli declared the motion carried.**

**MAYOR'S REPORT: A letter was read to the Stickney Fire Department from Richard Stoehmann Fire Certification Specialist I who is from the Office of the State Fire Marshall. He met with the Chief to report on the results of the audit of our training. The audit results are on the Fire Marshall's portal. The Stickney Fire Department was found to have a well-run training program. It was mentioned that we are extremely organized.**

**Mayor Morelli mentioned that we are not ready for the appointments to the Parks and Recreation Committee. She asked that #7 be struck from the agenda.**

**CLERK'S REPORT: A letter of thanks was received from Doris Helebrandt, Vice President, American Legion Auxiliary, Stickney Post 687. She wanted to show her appreciation to the Village of Stickney in their help it organizing the Memorial Day ceremony. Specific people were named for their assistance.**

**TRUSTEE'S REPORTS:** Trustee Mary Hrejsa explained that at the last board meeting the mayor appointed seven people to have on the Park & Rec Advisory Committee. She then said that Trustee Hrejsa could appoint two. The following email was then read: "Sorry I didn't respond earlier to your emails. Just got my email up and running this afternoon. I asked Martha Gomez and Linda Bruscato if they were interested in being on the parks and rec advisory committee, they said yes." Trustee Hrejsa explained that they are the most hard-working volunteers this village has ever seen. They have lived here for years. The Trustee then went back to reading the email. "Very sorry I didn't get back to you sooner, but we were having trouble getting me connected on the computer." The response from the mayor was then read. "Thank you for your recommendations for appointments to the Parks & Recreation Committee. "I have reviewed your recommendations and am declining to make your requested appointments. If you wish to put forth 2 different persons for my consideration, please let me know on or before Tuesday, June 10. If you don't wish to put forward 2 other persons for my consideration, I will make appointments to fill the 2 vacancies at the Board Meeting of June 16<sup>th</sup>."

Trustee Hrejsa then stated that when she ran for trustee, I talked to many village residents. . . . they actually came to her. She promised the residents that she would work for them, only for them. They came with questions and a lot of them. She told them that they have her word that she would work for them, only them, and do the best she could for them. And, she still will. There were questions and a lot of them.. She said, "You have my word." She then injected that she got a lot more votes than seven votes. To them she said, "I am doing my best but sometimes your hands are tied." "I have no control over this." "But, I will never stop trying." "I will go to the residents and tell them what happened here." "And, I am not here for me." "I don't want my picture in the newspaper." "I don't want my picture on Facebook." "I am doing it for the town because I love this village and the residents."

Trustee Hrejsa asked, "I would love to know her reason for denying the two wonderful people that have worked so hard for this village." "I don't think I will get a straight answer." "But, I want to end with my sincere apologies to Martha Gomez and Linda Bruscato who are the most dedicated, proven, successful volunteers I know." "They have worked harder than anyone." "There are many volunteers that work hard." "But there are many that just talk and don't do anything." "You are not going to get anywhere if you don't work hard."

Trustee Hrejsa went on to say, "The mayor asked me for second best choice." "I don't have any." "I picked the best." "If the mayor wants second best, she can make those appointments herself."

Trustee Milenkovic stated that he has received complaints from residents concerning shrubs in the parkways creating blind spots for drivers. Trustee Milenkovic spoke to Public Works Supervisor Jeff Boyajian about trimming or removing some of the shrubs. Supervisor Boyajian will address this. Trustee Milenkovic then provided information pertaining to the next meeting of Midway Noise Compatibility Commission on July 23. Our permanent noise monitor is located at 4308 Wenonah. We have the lowest noise readings of the 12 monitors locate around Midway. This year so far there have been no noise complaints from Stickney. Trustee Milenkovic is

working on complaints concerning the train whistles. Fire Chief Larry Meyer took him and Trustee Hrejsa on a tour of the east end of the Stickney industrial area. Home Depot is doing a service project at Edison School next week. They will be working on the planters at the main entrance. Finally, he thanked Clerk McAdams for a wonderful Memorial Day service. He included Joe Lopez for cooking, the American Legion for hosting, the fire department for bringing the chairs and the lectern, Sergeant Wiseman for doing the Honor Guard, the woman's auxiliary of the Legion (namely Doris Helebrandt and Sylvia Hosek for setting up the hall and serving the food) and Natasha Dzolic for shopping for all the food.

Trustee Savopoulos informed us of the 50/50 sidewalk program. We have a stack of applications. Our budget is \$17,000 and we are almost there. The cutoff will be June 30 to accept applications. This way we can get the money in. Public Works Supervisor Jeff Boyajian will then go out and mark all the sidewalks. Ridgeland Avenue is all done. Those sidewalks are all done.

Trustee White spoke to Treasurer Kurt Kasnicka about our American Express Corporate card. All of our paperwork is in for that. We should have that card very soon. We will be using that card to pay our water bill for Chicago. We will earn a cash rebate at the end of the year. Concerning the electronic recycling with Seguin Services; Public Works Supervisor Jeff Boyajian had an opportunity to speak with the manager there. We will be able to get rid of some of our recyclables there. During the next few weeks we will get started on our budget. Hopefully we will be able to get a budget done in a timely fashion. He was disheartened learning that employee raises were given out. He doesn't understand how we could give out raises when we haven't done our budget. The Treasurer, Kurt Kasnicka, was not in attendance at this meeting. Trustee White asked the Mayor if they gave out raises. Mayor Morelli answered, "That is something that the Mayor is able to do." Trustee White remarked that, "We could do that without even knowing our budget." "Even after what we went through last year when we had such a controversy over the raises." "Now our budget doesn't get done until June." He asked when the raises were given out and how much were they. Mayor Morelli responded, "She believes that they just went through now." "Everybody got 2%." Trustee White stated that we have a contractual agreement with the police department for 2%. We are not paying them because we are waiting for our budget. It is an obligation that we cannot get away from. We have yet to give them their back pay and yet we are giving out raises to people who are not in the union. If we are giving out raises in April or May, then our budget meetings should be pushed back in January.

Senator Sandoval spoke to the assembly. He congratulated the Mayor upon completing her second year. Stickney is known as a community that cares. He also congratulated the new trustees. His visit was to remind us that Governor Rauder is planning on shutting down state government on July 1. Senator Sandoval did vote on a responsible budget spending plan that the governor refuses to accept. Senator Sandoval said the governor refused to sit down and discuss the budget. The governor has stated that the legislators must give him "right to work" and "worker's comp reforms", neither of which is not related to the budget. The Senator reminded us that we have responsible representatives that we have sent to Springfield. The



constitution mandates that the legislators have a budget delivered by May 31. Usually it is agreed upon by the governor and the general assembly. The house and the senate came together early on to an agreement. The governor refused to meet with them. Instead, he the toured the state to talk about his reforms. Finally, the governor said, "Give me my agenda and then we will talk about yours."

Senator Sandoval warned us that we may be seeing some very serious cuts to our budgets in the upcoming 30 days. If there is no budget deal by July 1, the state government will shut down. Serious consequences will be felt.

The Senator expected a bipartisan agreement. He is not too sure that there will be an agreement. He suggested that we reach out to our legislators with our concerns.

DEPARTMENT REPORTS: Police Chief John Sladetz advised us he will be having a meeting with our phone company the next day. The police department and the fire department are conducting evacuation drills with Edison and Home Schools.

PUBLIC WORKS SUPERVISOR JEFF BOYAJIAN spoke about the electronic recycling program that was cut by the state. Through Trustee White's contact with Seguin Services, we are now talking with them. They are a middleman. We are slowly emptying our building of the electronics that we have stored there. Right now Seguin is a holding area. Once they have a certain quantity, they call for a pickup. They then receive payment for the electronics that they use for their programs. The supervisor explained that we had been paying \$250 just for the previous service to send out a truck. Then it was \$.14 per pound for TVs and monitors. With this Seguin program, we have to pay a little bit for the TVs and monitors and we don't have to pay the travel fees. We were notified that the dog park has reopened.

FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORTS: Chief Larry Meyer announced that the State Fire Marshal has audited the fire department. They review the training hours. In addition, we were informed that the fire department is having troubles with their phones. They are involved with all of our schools. This week they are doing a simulated evacuation drill at both schools.

There being no further business, Trustee Lazansky moved, duly seconded by Trustee Gomez that the meeting be adjourned. Upon which the Board adopted the motion at 7:32 p.m.

## **ORDINANCE NO. 2015-06**

### **AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING THE PREVAILING WAGE RATES FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OF PUBLIC WORKS PROJECTS FOR THE VILLAGE OF STICKNEY**

**WHEREAS**, the Village of Stickney (the "Village") is a home rule municipal corporation in accordance with Article VII, Section 6(a) of the Constitution of the State of Illinois of 1970; and

**WHEREAS**, the Village has the authority to adopt ordinances and to promulgate rules and regulations that pertain to its government and affairs, and to review, interpret and amend its ordinances, rules and regulations; and

**WHEREAS**, the State of Illinois has enacted the Prevailing Wage Act (820 ILCS 130/0.01, *et seq.*) (the "Act"), which regulates the wages of laborers, mechanics and other workers employed in any public works by the state, county, city or any public body or political subdivision or by anyone under contract for public works projects; and

**WHEREAS**, the Act requires the Village to investigate and ascertain the prevailing rate of wages, as defined in the Act, for laborers, mechanics and other workers in the locality of the Village employed in performing the construction of public works projects for the Village; and

**WHEREAS**, the Illinois Department of Labor ("IDOL") issued revised prevailing wage rates for laborers, mechanics and other workers performing the construction of public works projects for June of this year; and

**WHEREAS**, in order to provide adequate notice to Village workers and residents, the Village President (the "President") and the Board of Trustees of the Village (the "Village Board" and with the President, the "Corporate Authorities") have determined that it is in the best interests of the Village to adopt IDOL's revised prevailing rate of wages for the construction of public works projects in the Village (the "Determination"), attached hereto and incorporated herein as Exhibit A;

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE PRESIDENT AND BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF STICKNEY, COOK COUNTY, ILLINOIS, as follows:**

#### **ARTICLE I. IN GENERAL**

##### **SECTION 1. INCORPORATION CLAUSE.**

The Corporate Authorities hereby find that all of the recitals hereinbefore stated as contained in the preambles to this Ordinance are full, true and correct and do hereby, by reference, incorporate and make them part of this Ordinance as legislative findings.

##### **SECTION 2. PURPOSE.**

The purpose of this Ordinance is to establish the prevailing wage rates for the construction of public works projects in the Village, in accordance with the Act and the Determination.

## **ARTICLE II. AUTHORIZATION**

### **SECTION 3. AUTHORIZATION.**

To the extent and as required by the Act, the general prevailing rate of wages in the Village for laborers, mechanics and other workers engaged in the construction of public works projects coming under the jurisdiction of the Village is ascertained to be the same as the prevailing rate of wages for construction work within the Cook County, Illinois, area, as determined by IDOL as of June 2015. The definition of any terms appearing in this Ordinance that are also used in the Act shall be the same as in the Act. As required by the Act, any and all revisions of the prevailing rate of wages made by IDOL shall supersede the Village's current Determination for the construction of public works projects in the Village. Nothing herein shall be construed to apply the general prevailing rate of wages as herein ascertained to any work or employment except public works of the Village to the extent required by the Act.

#### **SECTION 3.01. OTHER ACTIONS AUTHORIZED.**

The Village Clerk or a designee of the same is hereby authorized and directed to: (a) publicly post, or keep available for inspection by any interested party in the main office of the Village, the Determination; (b) promptly (and in no event later than July 15, 2015) file a certified copy of this Ordinance and the Determination in the office of IDOL; and (c) within thirty (30) calendar days after filing with IDOL, publish in a newspaper of general circulation within the Village that the Determination is effective, publish a notice of the Determination and promptly mail a copy of the Determination to any employer, to any association of employers and to any person or association of employees who have filed or who file their names and addresses, requesting copies of any determination, stating the particular rates and the particular class of workers whose wages will be affected by such rates. The officers, employees and/or agents of the Village shall take all action necessary or reasonably required to carry out, give effect to and consummate the intent of this Ordinance and shall take all action necessary in conformity therewith. The officers, employees and/or agents of the Village are specifically authorized and directed to draft and disseminate any and all necessary forms to be utilized in connection with this Ordinance.

## **ARTICLE III. HEADINGS, SAVINGS CLAUSES, PUBLICATION, EFFECTIVE DATE**

### **SECTION 4. HEADINGS.**

The headings of the articles, sections, paragraphs and subparagraphs of this Ordinance are inserted solely for the convenience of reference and form no substantive part of this Ordinance nor should they be used in any interpretation or construction of any substantive provision of this Ordinance.

### **SECTION 5. SEVERABILITY.**

The provisions of this Ordinance are hereby declared to be severable and should any provision of this Ordinance be determined to be in conflict with any law, statute or regulation by a court of competent jurisdiction, said provision shall be excluded and deemed inoperative, unenforceable and as though not provided for herein and all other provisions shall remain unaffected, unimpaired, valid and in full force and effect.



**SECTION 6. SUPERSEDER.**

All code provisions, ordinances, resolutions, rules and orders, or parts thereof, in conflict herewith are, to the extent of such conflict, hereby superseded.

**SECTION 7. PUBLICATION.**

A full, true and complete copy of this Ordinance shall be published in pamphlet form or in a newspaper published and of general circulation within the Village as provided by the Illinois Municipal Code, as amended.

**SECTION 8. EFFECTIVE DATE.**

This Ordinance shall be effective and in full force immediately upon passage and approval.

## Explanations

### COOK COUNTY

The following list is considered as those days for which holiday rates of wages for work performed apply: New Years Day, Memorial Day, Fourth of July, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day, Christmas Day and Veterans Day in some classifications/counties. Generally, any of these holidays which fall on a Sunday is celebrated on the following Monday. This then makes work performed on that Monday payable at the appropriate overtime rate for holiday pay. Common practice in a given local may alter certain days of celebration. If in doubt, please check with IDOL.

TRUCK DRIVERS (WEST) - That part of the county West of Barrington Road.

### EXPLANATION OF CLASSES

ASBESTOS - GENERAL - removal of asbestos material/mold and hazardous materials from any place in a building, including mechanical systems where those mechanical systems are to be removed. This includes the removal of asbestos materials/mold and hazardous materials from ductwork or pipes in a building when the building is to be demolished at the time or at some close future date.

ASBESTOS - MECHANICAL - removal of asbestos material from mechanical systems, such as pipes, ducts, and boilers, where the mechanical systems are to remain.

### CERAMIC TILE FINISHER

The grouting, cleaning, and polishing of all classes of tile, whether for interior or exterior purposes, all burned, glazed or unglazed products; all composition materials, granite tiles, warning detectable tiles, cement tiles, epoxy composite materials, pavers, glass, mosaics, fiberglass, and all substitute materials, for tile made in tile-like units; all mixtures in tile like form of cement, metals, and other materials that are for and intended for use as a finished floor surface, stair treads, promenade roofs, walks, walls, ceilings,



swimming pools, and all other places where tile is to form a finished interior or exterior. The mixing of all setting mortars including but not limited to thin-set mortars, epoxies, wall mud, and any other sand and cement mixtures or adhesives when used in the preparation, installation, repair, or maintenance of tile and/or similar materials. The handling and unloading of all sand, cement, lime, tile, fixtures, equipment, adhesives, or any other materials to be used in the preparation, installation, repair, or maintenance of tile and/or similar materials. Ceramic Tile Finishers shall fill all joints and voids regardless of method on all tile work, particularly and especially after installation of said tile work. Application of any and all protective coverings to all types of tile installations including, but not be limited to, all soap compounds, paper products, tapes, and all polyethylene coverings, plywood, masonite, cardboard, and any new type of products that may be used to protect tile installations, Blastrac equipment, and all floor scarifying equipment used in preparing floors to receive tile. The clean up and removal of all waste and materials. All demolition of existing tile floors and walls to be re-tiled.

#### COMMUNICATIONS ELECTRICIAN

Installation, operation, inspection, maintenance, repair and service of radio, television, recording, voice sound vision production and reproduction, telephone and telephone interconnect, facsimile, data apparatus, coaxial, fibre optic and wireless equipment, appliances and systems used for the transmission and reception of signals of any nature, business, domestic, commercial, education, entertainment, and residential purposes, including but not limited to, communication and telephone, electronic and sound equipment, fibre optic and data communication systems, and the performance of any task directly related to such installation or service whether at new or existing sites, such tasks to include the placing of wire and cable and electrical power conduit or other raceway work within the equipment room and pulling wire and/or cable through conduit and the installation of any incidental conduit, such that the employees covered hereby can complete any job in full.

#### MARBLE FINISHER

Loading and unloading trucks, distribution of all materials (all stone, sand, etc.), stocking of floors with material, performing all rigging for heavy work, the handling of all material that may be needed for the installation of such materials, building of scaffolding, polishing if needed, patching, waxing of material if damaged, pointing up, caulking, grouting and cleaning of marble, holding water on diamond or Carborundum blade or saw for setters cutting, use of tub saw or any other saw needed for preparation of material, drilling of holes for wires that anchor material set by setters, mixing up of molding plaster for installation of material, mixing up thin set for the installation of material, mixing up of sand to cement for the installation of material and such other work as may be required in helping a Marble Setter in the handling of all material in the erection or installation of interior marble, slate, travertine, art marble, serpentine, alberene stone, blue stone, granite and other stones (meaning as to stone any foreign or domestic materials as are specified and used in building interiors and exteriors and customarily known as stone in the trade), carrara, sanionyx, vitrolite and similar opaque glass and the laying of all marble tile, terrazzo tile, slate tile and precast tile, steps, risers treads, base, or any other materials that may be used as substitutes for any of the aforementioned materials and which are used on interior and exterior which are installed in a similar manner.

MATERIAL TESTER I: Hand coring and drilling for testing of materials; field inspection of uncured concrete and asphalt.

MATERIAL TESTER II: Field inspection of welds, structural steel, fireproofing, masonry, soil, facade, reinforcing steel, formwork, cured concrete, and concrete and asphalt batch plants; adjusting proportions of bituminous mixtures.

The handling of sand, cement, marble chips, and all other materials that may be used by the Mosaic Terrazzo Mechanic, and the mixing, grinding, grouting, cleaning and sealing of all Marble, Mosaic, and Terrazzo work, floors, base, stairs, and wainscoting by hand or machine, and in addition, assisting and aiding Marble, Masonic, and Terrazzo Mechanics.

## TRAFFIC SAFETY

Work associated with barricades, horses and drums used to reduce lane usage on highway work, the installation and removal of temporary lane markings, and the installation and removal of temporary road signs.

## TRUCK DRIVER - BUILDING, HEAVY AND HIGHWAY CONSTRUCTION - EAST & WEST

Class 1. Two or three Axle Trucks. A-frame Truck when used for transportation purposes; Air Compressors and Welding Machines, including those pulled by cars, pick-up trucks and tractors; Ambulances; Batch Gate Lockers; Batch Hopperman; Car and Truck Washers; Carry-alls; Fork Lifts and Hoisters; Helpers; Mechanics Helpers and Greasers; Oil Distributors 2-man operation; Pavement Breakers; Pole Trailer, up to 40 feet; Power Mower Tractors; Self-propelled Chip Spreader; Skipman; Slurry Trucks, 2-man operation; Slurry Truck Conveyor Operation, 2 or 3 man; Teamsters; Unskilled Dumpman; and Truck Drivers hauling warning lights, barricades, and portable toilets on the job site.

Class 2. Four axle trucks; Dump Crets and Adgetors under 7 yards; Dumpsters, Track Trucks, Euclids, Hug Bottom Dump Turnapulls or Turnatrailers when pulling other than self-loading equipment or similar equipment under 16 cubic yards; Mixer Trucks under 7 yards; Ready-mix Plant Hopper Operator, and Winch Trucks, 2 Axles.

Class 3. Five axle trucks; Dump Crets and Adgetors 7 yards and over; Dumpsters, Track Trucks, Euclids, Hug Bottom Dump Turnatrailers or turnapulls when pulling other than self-loading equipment or similar

equipment over 16 cubic yards; Explosives and/or Fission Material Trucks; Mixer Trucks 7 yards or over; Mobile Cranes while in transit; Oil Distributors, 1-man operation; Pole Trailer, over 40 feet; Pole and Expandable Trailers hauling material over 50 feet long; Slurry trucks, 1-man operation; Winch trucks, 3 axles or more; Mechanic--Truck Welder and Truck Painter.

Class 4. Six axle trucks; Dual-purpose vehicles, such as mounted crane trucks with hoist and accessories; Foreman; Master Mechanic; Self-loading equipment like P.B. and trucks with scoops on the front.

#### Other Classifications of Work:

For definitions of classifications not otherwise set out, the Department generally has on file such definitions which are available. If a task to be performed is not subject to one of the classifications of pay set out, the Department will upon being contacted state which neighboring county has such a classification and provide such rate, such rate being deemed to exist by reference in this document. If no neighboring county rate applies to the task, the Department shall undertake a special determination, such special determination being then deemed to have existed under this determination. If a project requires these, or any classification not listed, please contact IDOL at 217-782-1710 for wage rates or clarifications.

#### LANDSCAPING

Landscaping work falls under the existing classifications for laborer, operating engineer and truck driver. The work performed by landscape plantsman and landscape laborer is covered by the existing classification of laborer. The work performed by landscape operators (regardless of equipment used or its size) is covered by the classifications of operating engineer. The work performed by landscape truck drivers (regardless of size of truck driven) is covered by the classifications of truck driver.

#### MATERIAL TESTER & MATERIAL TESTER/INSPECTOR I AND II

Notwithstanding the difference in the classification title, the classification entitled "Material Tester I" involves the same job duties as the classification entitled "Material Tester/Inspector I". Likewise, the classification entitled "Material Tester II" involves the same job duties as the classification entitled "Material Tester/Inspector II".



GAS ORDINANCE 2015-07

AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING NORTHERN ILLINOIS GAS COMPANY (d/b/a NICOR GAS COMPANY) ITS SUCCESSORS AND ASSIGNS, TO CONSTRUCT, OPERATE AND MAINTAIN A GAS DISTRIBUTING SYSTEM IN AND THROUGH THE VILLAGE OF STICKNEY, ILLINOIS.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE PRESIDENT AND BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF STICKNEY, ILLINOIS:

SECTION 1. That the right, permission and authority be and the same are hereby granted to NORTHERN ILLINOIS GAS COMPANY (d/b/a NICOR GAS COMPANY), an Illinois corporation, its successors and assigns (hereinafter referred to as the "Grantee"), to construct, operate and maintain in and through the VILLAGE OF STICKNEY (hereinafter referred to as the "Municipality"), in the State of Illinois, for a term of Thirty-Five (35) years, a system for the production, distribution and sale of gas for fuel, heating, power, processing and other purposes within and outside the corporate limits of the Municipality, and to construct, lay, maintain and operate such gas pipes, mains, conductors and other devices, apparatus and equipment as may be necessary or convenient for such system in, under, along and across each and all of the streets, alleys, avenues and other public places in the Municipality, subject to the conditions and regulations hereinafter set forth.

SECTION 2. All pipes, mains, conductors and other appliances, including connections with service pipes, hereafter laid in streets, alleys, avenues or other public places, shall be laid under the supervision of the Committee on Streets and Alleys of the Municipality, or such other duly authorized agent of the Municipality as the Board of Trustees may from time

to time designate. All pipes, mains, conductors and other appliances shall be so located as not to injure unnecessarily any drains, sewers, catch basins, water pipes, pavements or other like public improvements, but should any drain, sewer, catch basin, water pipe, pavement or other like public improvement be injured by such location, the Grantee shall forthwith repair the damage caused by such injury to the satisfaction of the Committee on Streets and Alleys, or such other duly authorized agent, and in default thereof the Municipality may repair such damage and charge the cost thereof to, and collect the same from, the Grantee. The Grantee shall be subject to all reasonable regulations which may now or hereafter be prescribed by general ordinance of the Municipality with respect to the use of the public streets, alleys, avenues and other public places of the Municipality.

SECTION 3. The Grantee shall indemnify, become responsible for and forever save harmless the Municipality from any and all judgments, damages, decrees, costs and expenses, including attorneys' fees, which the Municipality may legally suffer or incur, or which may be legally obtained against the Municipality, for or by reason of the use and occupation of any street, alley, avenue or other public place in the Municipality by the Grantee pursuant to the terms of this ordinance or legally resulting from the exercise by the Grantee of any of the privileges herein granted; except that the indemnity provided for in this Section 3 shall not apply to any liability, judgments, damages, decrees, costs and expenses determined by a court of competent jurisdiction to have resulted from the negligence or intentional acts or omissions of Municipality, its agents and employees.

SECTION 4. After the passage of this ordinance, and within thirty (30) days after passage, this ordinance, if accepted, shall be accepted by the Grantee by its filing with the Village Clerk of the Municipality an unconditional written acceptance hereof, to be duly

executed according to law, and a failure of the Grantee to so accept this ordinance within said period of time shall be deemed a rejection hereof by the Grantee, and the rights and privileges herein granted shall after the expiration of said period of thirty (30) days, if not so accepted, absolutely cease and determine, unless said period of time shall be extended by the Municipality by ordinance duly passed for that purpose and before the expiration of said period of thirty (30) days.

SECTION 5. All provisions of this ordinance which are obligatory upon, or which inure to the benefit of, said NORTHERN ILLINOIS GAS COMPANY (d/b/a NICOR GAS COMPANY) shall also be obligatory upon and shall inure to the benefit of any and all successors and assigns of said Company, and the word "Grantee" wherever appearing in this ordinance shall include and be taken to mean not only said NORTHERN ILLINOIS GAS COMPANY (d/b/a NICOR GAS COMPANY), but also each and all of such successors and assigns.

SECTION 6. This ordinance, if accepted by the Grantee as hereinabove provided, shall be in full force and effect as of August 3, 2015, and from and after the effective date shall supersede, cancel, repeal and be in lieu of any and all other existing or prior grants of right, permission and authority by said Municipality to said Grantee or any predecessor companies or assignors of the Grantee to construct, operate and maintain any system for the production, distribution and sale of gas for fuel, heating, power, processing and any other purposes within the corporate limits of this Municipality, and this ordinance shall likewise cancel all of the obligations under said existing or prior grants.

**SUBJECT: SUMMARY OF TERMS OF THE NICOR FRANCHISE AGREEMENT**

This memorandum summarizes the key terms of the proposed franchise agreement (the “Agreement”) with Northern Illinois Gas Company d/b/a/ Nicor Gas Company (“Nicor”). Under the agreement, Nicor will continue to be permitted to run gas lines through the Village of Stickney (the “Village”) to provide its services to residents and businesses.

**Term:** The existing franchise agreement was entered into in 1971 and will expire on August 3, 2015. The proposed Agreement becomes effective upon the execution of the Gas Ordinance provided by Nicor. The term of the Agreement is thirty-five (35) years.

**Free Natural Gas Service:** The Village of Stickney (the “Village”) currently receives 19,800 therms (a unit of energy) as remuneration under the existing franchise agreement. The total number of allotted therms is determined at the time of the census. The Village currently uses these therms to heat three (3) municipal buildings: 6401 43<sup>rd</sup> Street, 6533 Pershing Road and 6433 43<sup>rd</sup> Street. According to Nicor, the Village routinely utilizes all allotted therms and has not had unused therms since 2009. Nicor proposes to continue providing the Village with 19,800 therms per year under the new Agreement.
