The Board of Trustees of the Village of Stickney met in regular session on Tuesday, February 5, 2019, at 7:00 p.m. in the Stickney Village Hall, 6533 W. Pershing Road, Stickney, Illinois.

Upon the roll call, the following Trustees were present: Trustees Hrejsa, Kapolnek, Milenkovic, Savopoulos, Torres and White

Trustee Milenkovic moved to approve the minutes as amended, duly seconded by Trustee Savopoulos of the previous regular session on Tuesday, January 16, 2019.

Upon the roll call, the following Trustees voted: Ayes: Trustee Hrejsa, Kapolnek, Milenkovic, Savopoulos, Torres and White Nays: None Mayor Walik declared the motion carried.

Trustee White moved, duly seconded by Trustee Savopoulos that the bills, approved by the various committees of the Board, be approved for payment, and to approve warrants which authorize the Village Treasurer to draw checks to pay the bills, to be signed by the authorized signers, as provided for by the Ordinances of the Village of Stickney.

Prior to the vote, Treasurer Paul Nosek provided a summary indicating the source of funds used to pay the bills and the totals to be approved.

Upon the roll call, the following Trustees voted: Ayes: Trustee Hrejsa, Kapolnek, Milenkovic, Savopoulos, Torres and White Nays: None Mayor Walik declared the motion carried. Mayor Walik introduced representatives from Commonwealth Edison, Tiffany Ingram and Angel Perez for a presentation. The Mayor explained that Tiffany is our new representative. She has called the Mayor prior to the Polar Vortex to inform him that there will be extra crews on duty and in our area. She called on Sunday to find out if we had any issues. Tiffany explained that the Village of Stickney has secured 74 street lights and then presented the Village of Stickney with a check for \$11,160.80. These new lights will result in over 66,000 kilowatts saved. She praised the Village for taking advantage of the incentive that was available. A plaque was presented to the Mayor.

At this point, Mayor Walik asked that our newest Police Officer Roberto Santos to come forward to take his Oath of Office.

Deputy Chief Rich Jaczak addressed the audience with the following for special presentations:

"On January 5, 2019 a victim had her purse stolen at a local business in the Village of Stickney. A suspect was quickly identified with the help of witnesses; however, locating the offender became a complex task. Detective Sergeant Crus Ortiz, Jr. worked with numerous other law enforcement agencies to determine locations where the offender may be found."

"Sergeant Ortiz obtained an arrest warrant for the offender and coordinated extensively with the Kankakee County Sheriff's Office to take her into custody after she attended an unrelated court hearing. Officers were then able to obtain a full confession from the offender."

Sergeant Ortiz was given an Honorable Mention for his efforts to make an arrest.

Deputy Chief Jaczak also mentioned the exceptional act by Corporal Kozelka, Corporal Lochridge and Officer Maria Guzman when they came across an unresponsive individual. They administered CPR and Narcan and brought the individual back. Awards were previously given to them.

"On January 1, 2019 the Stickney Police and Fire Departments responded to a report of a house fire on the 6500 block of 41st Street. Officer Pedro Garcia arrived on the scene and observed black smoke coming from the house. He then saw one of the residents run back into the house. Officer Garcia called out to the resident several times but did not get a response. The resident was then seen emerging from the kitchen area and then collapsed onto the living room floor."

"Officer Garcia then entered the house and dragged the resident out to safety where he could receive medical attention."

"I am requesting that Officer Garcia be given a Department Commendation for his actions during this event. Sergeant Figueroa was also present. The Medal of Valor was given to Officer Garcia. This is the second one given to this department. The first one was given to Officer Ramski."

The Mayor mentioned that in his twenty years in law enforcement neither he nor his partners had an opportunity to save somebody. Mayor Tabor gave out a lifesaving award during his time. He thanked his officers, ComEd and audience for coming out.

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<u>CLERK'S REPORT:</u> The Clerk read a notice from the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency concerning the McCook Transfer Station.

<u>TRUSTEE REPORTS</u>: All the Trustees gave congratulations to our newest police officer.

<u>Trustee Hrejsa</u> notified us that the Parks and Recreation Committee will be meeting soon to plan for the Easter event. The trustee gave praise to our police, fire and public works departments over the extreme weather.

<u>Trustee Kapolnek</u> informed the audience that there will be a senior and disabled care program in the Village. It will include lawn mowing and snow shoveling. It will be in the newsletter. People have to come in to fill out the application. There will be 40 spots available. The Mayor added in that people will have to include a doctor's note.

<u>Trustee Torres</u> thanked the police, fire and public works for doing a fine job during the extreme weather. She congratulated the individuals from the Police Department that received awards.

<u>Trustee Milenkovic</u> attended the Midway Noise Compatibility Commission on January 24th at the Mayfield facility on Archer. There were no noise complaints from Stickney on the airport. Our monitor is located at 4308 Wenonah. The noise level for the 4th quarter of 2018 was 18 decibels which was 3.8 decibels less than the 4th quarter of 2017. Trustee Milenkovic thanked Trustee Kapolnek for joining him at this meeting. In addition, Trustee Milenkovic gave us the salt usage report for January. There was 188 tons of road salt used. We were reminded that Monday, February 18 is President's Day and therefore the Village Hall will be closed. Services will be delayed by one day.

Trustee Savopoulos thanked our first responders.

<u>Trustee White</u> welcomed aboard our new police officer. He mentioned the elite in our Police Department. He considered Officer Mark Kozelka as elite. Trustee White added that he would like Officer Kozelka to be the one to come to his assistance if ever he needed someone to give CPR. We have the right people in charge to help us through this weather.

DEPARTMENT REPORTS:

<u>Fire Chief Jeff Boyajian</u> informed us that they fought a fire at the race track during 20 degree weather. A total of three apartments were lost to fire or water damage. The guys did a good job. The Mayor added that the fire department and Officer Kozelka gave life-saving assistance to his own neighbor.

<u>Chief Dan Babich</u> thanked the Village Board now that they are fully staffed at 18 police officers. The time line of schedules was given to bring the new officers into the schedules.

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<u>Deputy Police Chief Rich Jaczak</u> thanked the Police and Fire Commissioners who were at the meeting. He mentioned that the last four officers that were hired were vetted by this commission. The Deputy then presented the following:

At this point the Deputy Chief explained that INDEX CRIMES OFFENSES is what we have to report to the FBI. He would say that the best way to judge a town is by their murders and stolen cars. Those are the only two crimes you would expect to get reported 100% of the time.

The Deputy Chief added that our crime rate is very low. It has been low for the past two years. We place a lot of emphases on alley patrols, regular street patrols and we are spending a lot of time with our schools. While we spend a lot of time on that, our funds collected is going up.

The Deputy closed by saying, "Every six months these numbers are actually getting bigger. When we are fully staffed we expect it to continue to get bigger, especially with all these young officers."

<u>Fire Chief Jeff Boyajian</u> announced that Captain Tom Heller, who oversaw the Fire Prevention Bureau, retired. He will continue as the Fire Chief in Forest View.

<u>Public Works Supervisor</u> Joe Lopez informed us that the street sweeper was out this week. The Public Works employees worked diligently for the last two days. The Mayor added that they were on 12-hour shifts to have full 24-hour coverage. They worked four days straight clearing the sidewalks, Pershing Road, bus stops and the parks. Page 5

ORDINANCE NO. 2019-02

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 14, SECTION 14-141, SECTION 147, AND DIVISION 9 OF THE MUNICIPAL CODE, VILLAGE OF STICKNEY, ILLINOIS REGARDING VEHICLE IMMOBILIZATION, TOWING AND IMPOUNDING

WHEREAS, the Village of Stickney (the "Village") is a home rule municipal corporation in accordance with Article VII, Section 6(a) of the Constitution of the State of Illinois of 1970; and

WHEREAS, the Village has the authority to adopt ordinances and to promulgate rules and regulations that pertain to its government and affairs, and to review, interpret and amend its ordinances, rules and regulations; and

WHEREAS, the Village President (the "President") and the Board of Trustees of the Village (the "Village Board" and with the President, the "Corporate Authorities") are committed to ensuring the health, safety and welfare of individuals residing in, working in and visiting the Village; and

WHEREAS, the Municipal Code, Village of Stickney, Illinois (the "Village Code") currently sets forth certain regulations for the immobilization, towing and impounding of vehicles (the "Existing Regulations"); and

WHEREAS, the Corporate Authorities recognize the need to amend, update and clarify the Existing Regulations from time to time; and

WHEREAS, the Corporate Authorities find that vehicles are sometimes abandoned in the Village, thereby creating a nuisance and posing a danger to the health, safety and welfare of the community, particularly where the abandoned vehicles remain on the street, unattended and unmoved, for seven (7) or more days, or remain on the street or otherwise block certain municipal and emergency services. For instance, a vehicle parked in the path of a snow plow or other snow removal equipment on a designated plow day, thereby preventing the road from being clear for use by emergency vehicles and personnel, as well as the general public thus posing a threat to the emergency vehicles and services ability to perform their functions; and

WHEREAS, the Corporate Authorities recognize this nuisance and threat to the health, safety and welfare of the community and thus, wish to remove vehicles blocking the right of way preventing the provision of certain municipal services and emergency personnel and services and to remove abandoned vehicles as defined by the Village Code and state law after seven (7) days and to clarify the procedure regarding same; and

WHEREAS, the Corporate Authorities further wish to clean up and clarify some language and inconsistencies in the Existing Regulations; and

WHEREAS, based upon the foregoing, the Corporate Authorities have determined that it is in the best interests of the Village and its residents to amend Chapter 14, Section 14-141, Section 14-147 and Division 9 of the Village Code as set forth below;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE PRESIDENT AND BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF STICKNEY, COOK COUNTY, ILLINOIS, as follows:

ARTICLE I.

IN GENERAL

SECTION 1. INCORPORATION CLAUSE.

The Corporate Authorities hereby find that all of the recitals hereinbefore stated as contained in the preambles to this Ordinance are full, true and correct and do hereby, by reference, incorporate and make them part of this Ordinance as legislative findings.

SECTION 2. PURPOSE.

The purpose of this Ordinance is to amend Chapter 14, Section 14-141, Section 14-147 and Division 9 of the Village Code to update, amend, and clarify the Village's Existing Regulations, and to authorize the President or his designee to take all actions necessary to carry out the intent of this Ordinance.

ARTICLE II.

AMENDMENT OF CHAPTER 14, SECTION 14-141, SECTION 14-147 AND DIVISION 9 OF THE MUNICIPAL CODE, VILLAGE OF STICKNEY, ILLINOIS

SECTION 3.0 AMENDMENT OF CHAPTER 14, SECTION 14-141

That the Village Code is hereby amended, notwithstanding any provision, ordinance, resolution or Village Code section to the contrary, by amending Chapter 14, Section 14-141 by striking out any language to be removed or repealed and underlining any new language as follows:

Sec. 14-141. - Removal of illegally parked vehicles.

- (a) In addition to Chapter 14, Division 9, the police department and all members thereof assigned to traffic duty are hereby authorized to remove and tow away or have removed and towed away by commercial towing service, any car or other vehicle illegally parked in any place where such parked vehicle creates or constitutes a traffic hazard, blocks the use of a fire hydrant or obstructs or may obstruct the movement of any emergency vehicle, or blocks snow plows or other vehicles trying to maintain a clear path for emergency vehicles; or any other illegally parked vehicle which is parked in any public street or any other public place.
- (b) Cars so towed away shall be stored on village property or in a public garage or parking lot and shall be restored to the owner or operator thereof after payment of the expense incurred by the village in removing and storing such vehicles. <u>The registered owner shall also be responsible for the payment of an</u> <u>administrative cost of two-hundred dollars (\$200.00).</u>

SECTION 3.1 AMENDMENT OF CHAPTER 14, SECTION 14-147.

That the Village Code is hereby amended, notwithstanding any provision, ordinance, resolution or Village Code section to the contrary, by amending Chapter 14, Section 14-147 as follows:

Sec. 14-147. – Parking After Snowfalls.

(a) It shall be unlawful to park any vehicle when snowfall is over two inches as follows:

(1) On odd-numbered days from 8:00 a.m. to 11:00 p.m.

a. On the south side of all streets and public thoroughfares extending in a generally easterly and westerly direction, except for Pershing Road;

b. On the east side of all streets and public thoroughfares extending in a generally northerly and southerly direction, except Harlem Avenue.

(2) On even-numbered days from 8:00 a.m. to 11:00 p.m.

a. On the north side of all streets and public thoroughfares extending in a generally easterly and westerly direction, except for Pershing Road.

b. On the west side of all streets and public thoroughfares extending in a generally northerly and southerly direction, except for Harlem Avenue.

(b) It shall be unlawful to park any vehicle when snowfall is over six inches as follows:

(1) On Pershing Road between the hours of 12:00 a.m. to 5:00 a.m. pending removal.

a. One the south side of the street between Clinton and Ridgeland Avenue.

(c) When snowfall measures two inches or more, the snow removal regulations supersede the street sweeping regulations.

(d) Vehicles that fail to move their vehicles in the locations described in this section may have their vehicles towed or relocated by the Village or its agent to a municipal parking lot, public parking lot, or public street. The Village shall give notice to the registered owner of the vehicle that the vehicle was towed or relocated within three (3) business days of the relocation or tow. Said notice shall be by served by registered or certified mail, or personal delivery. Vehicles in violation of this Section that are on their third violation shall have their vehicle towed and shall no longer be eligible for vehicle relocation as it relates to towing. The registered owner of any towed vehicle shall be responsible for payment of an administrative cost of two hundred dollars (\$200.00).

SECTION 3.2 AMENDMENT OF CHAPTER 14, DIVISION 9.

That the Village Code is hereby amended, notwithstanding any provision, ordinance, resolution or Village Code section to the contrary, by amending Chapter 14, Division 9, in part, as follows:

Sec. 14-195 Definitions.

The following words, terms and phrases, when used in this division, shall have the meanings ascribed to them in this section, except where the context clearly indicates a different meaning:

Abandoned vehicle means a vehicle parked or otherwise located on the public way or public property and:

- (1) In such a state of disrepair that it is incapable of being driven; or
- (2) That has been unmoved for a period of five (5) seven (7) days.

Sec. 14-274. - Removal of abandoned or unattended vehicle located on highway.

When a vehicle is abandoned or left unattended upon a highway or public property in this eity <u>Village and the vehicle poses a public danger or nuisance</u> for ten (10) hours or more, the chief of police may authorize a towing service to relocate or tow and impound the vehicle to remove and impound it.

Registered owners of vehicles that have not moved or are inoperable as defined by the definition for abandoned vehicles shall have a notice posted to their vehicle or otherwise issued, and a notice sent by certified or registered mail informing the registered owner that the vehicle will deemed an abandoned vehicle if it has not been moved or operated in seven (7) days and it will be towed on the 8th day if the vehicles is not relocated. The registered owner shall be responsible for the costs of the towing, the storage of the vehicle, and an administrative cost of two-hundred (\$200.00).

SECTION 3.3. OTHER ACTIONS AUTHORIZED.

The officers, employees and/or agents of the Village shall take all action necessary or reasonably required to carry out, give effect to and consummate the amendments contemplated by this Ordinance and shall take all action necessary in conformity therewith, including, but not limited to, the installation of any street or parking signs as contemplated herein. The officers, employees and/or agents of the Village are specifically authorized and directed to draft and disseminate any and all necessary forms or notices to be utilized in connection with the intent of this Ordinance.

ARTICLE III. HEADINGS, SAVINGS CLAUSES, PUBLICATION, EFFECTIVE DATE

SECTION 4. HEADINGS.

The headings of the articles, sections, paragraphs and subparagraphs of this Ordinance are inserted solely for the convenience of reference and form no substantive part of this Ordinance nor should they be used in any interpretation or construction of any substantive provision of this Ordinance.

SECTION 5. SEVERABILITY.

The provisions of this Ordinance are hereby declared to be severable and should any provision of this Ordinance be determined to be in conflict with any law, statute or regulation by a court of competent jurisdiction, said provision shall be excluded and deemed inoperative, unenforceable and as though not provided for herein and all other provisions shall remain unaffected, unimpaired, valid and in full force and effect.

SECTION 6. SUPERSEDER.

All code provisions, ordinances, resolutions, rules and orders, or parts thereof, in conflict herewith are, to the extent of such conflict, hereby superseded.

SECTION 7. PUBLICATION.

A full, true and complete copy of this Ordinance shall be published in pamphlet form or in a newspaper published and of general circulation within the Village as provided by the Illinois Municipal Code, as amended.

SECTION 8. EFFECTIVE DATE.

This Ordinance shall be effective and in full force ten (10) days after its passage, approval and publication in accordance with Illinois law.
